## Notice of Election and Sale of Membership Tickets





## Established Policies

THE FOLLOWING POLICIES HAVE BEEN ESTABLISHED AND AUTHORIZED BY THE BELMONT CO. AGRICULTURAL SOCIETY BOARD OF DIRECTORS FOR THE 2019 BELMONT CO. FAIR.

- \*\* 1. No person shall be permitted to make solicitations of any nature, post or display signs, distribute handbills or advertising material, or sell or distribute free any merchandise, except persons in contracted concession or commercial rented spaces.
- \*\* 2. Disorderly people will be removed from grounds and illegally parked vehicles will be towed from grounds at owner's expense. Vehicles are prohibited from parking around the livestock barns.
- \*\* 3, NO alcoholic beverages or drugs are permitted on the fairgrounds or in the camping areas. Violators will be removed from the fairgrounds immediately and will not be permitted to return to the fairgrounds the remainder of the 2020 fair. In addition, violators will not be permitted on the fairgrounds or in camping areas for the 2021 fair.
  - \*\* 4. Concealed weapons are prohibited in buildings on the fairgrounds.
- \*\* 5. Hand held laser devices, build-up games, helium tanks or helium filled bal-

loons are prohibited. Violators will be subject to possible dismissal from the fairgrounds at the discretion of the concession manager and/or the Belmont County Agricultural Society.

- \*\* 6. ALL DOGS OR PETS (EXCEPT HELPER DOGS IN USE BY THEIR OWNER AND DOGS BEING USED IN CONTRACTED PERFORMANCES) ARE PROHIBITED ON GROUNDS OR IN EXHIBITION BUILDINGS.
- \*\* 7. Official veterinarian approved by the Ohio Department of Agriculture is Mary Emily Mowrer Stone House Veterinary Service, LLC.
- \*\* 8. All bills must be presented by Nov. 1 or they will not be paid within the fiscal year. All checks not cashed within 60 days will be voided and payment refused.
- \*\* 9. The Belmont Co. Agricultural Society is not responsible for printing errors in the 2019 Belmont Co.Fair Handbook.
- \*\*10. Lost and Found Dept. is located at the Secretary's Office, located next to the Carnes Center and Main Entrance.
- \*\*11. No Refunds No Rain Dates.
- 12. Not responsible for loss/damages to vehicles while parked in parking areas.

## Belmont County Agricultural Society Constitution and By-Laws

(As updated at the Annual Meeting of the membership, Nov. 29, 2019)

## CONSTITUTION

## **ARTICLE I - NAME**

SECTION 1. The Society shall be known as the "Belmont County Agricultural Society".

## **ARTICLE II - PURPOSE**

SECTION 1. The purpose of this Society shall be to promote and encourage agriculture, industry, schools, science, art and other interests of Belmont County, which the Board deems proper, and in the best interest of the community.

### ARTICLE III - MEMBERSHIP

SECTION 1. Any Belmont County resident 18 years of age or older may become a member of this Society by paying annually the membership fee fixed by the Board of Directors. Membership certificates shall entitle the member to whom it is sold admission to the fair as the Board of Directors may determine and to vote for directors at the annual election.

SECTION 2. No person shall pay for or secure more than one membership and that membership shall be for that person. No memberships shall be issued to any entity other than a natural person.

SECTION 3. Membership tickets shall be placed on sale annually beginning Thursday during the preceding years' county fair and shall remain on sale through the first day of the current years' fair. Notice of days, hours when memberships can be purchased and the place where they may be purchased shall be announced in the annual premium list and in at least one newspaper of general circulation in Belmont County, twice during the sale, once when they go on sale and again no less than seven or more than twenty-one days before the sale is terminated.

## ARTICLE IV - BOARD OF DIRECTORS

SECTION 1. The membership shall consist of 21 and no more than 24 elected members. In addition to the elected members, the County Superintendent of Schools and an employee of the Ohio State University Extension Service shall be Ex-Officio Members. All terms for directors shall be three (3) years with one-third of the directors elected annually.

SECTION 2. Any vacancy on the Board caused by death, resignation, refusal to qualify, removal from county or other cause may be filled by the Board until the next annual election, when a Director shall be elected for the unexpired term. Those wishing to be appointed to the BOARD must attend at least three meetings or two meetings with participationin two planned events, submit a letter of intent, and address the Board of Directors as to why they feel they would be an asset to the BOARD.

SECTION 2a. To protect and ensure the safety of children participants, all current directors (board members) will have a criminal background check undertaken by March 1, 2019 with the results to be submitted to the Belmont County Agricultural Society Secretary. After his or hers initial background check, each director shall un-

dertake to have an additional background check performed every three years with results submitted to Belmont County Agricultural Society Secretary. All candidates for a director (board) shall have a background check undertaken and the results submitted to Belmont County Agricultural Society before he or she is able to assume their position. Disqualifying criminal convictions are those listed in Ohio Reserve Code Section 109.572(a) (1). Any director found to have been convicted of any of these criminal offenses shall be removed from their positions. Any successful candidate for a director's position found to have been convicted of any of these criminal offenses will not be permitted to assume their position. Additionally, those charged with one of these offenses but not convicted, shall be required to abstain from any and all Belmont County Agricultural Society functions and activities until the matter has concluded. However should the candidate or director petition the BOARD that extenuating circumstances exist in regards to the criminal conviction or charge, the BOARD with \(^3\)4 vote in favor may permit the director to remain in his or her position.SECTION 3. Any officer or director absent for three consecutive regular meetings may have his/her office declared vacant by a majority vote of the Board of Directors. Any officer or director who fails to participate in twenty five percent of additional activities may have his/her office declared vacant by a majority vote of the Board of Directors.

SECTION 4. Any director who openly or actively works in any manner detrimental to the best interest of the Society as a whole may be removed from the Board of Directors by a majority vote of the Board of Directors. The director removed from the board by a majority vote of the Board of Directors will not be eligible to seek another term on the Board of Directors.

SECTION 5. Directors serving on the board more than nine years or three consecutive terms will receive a lifetime admission pass for the Belmont County Fair, upon retirement.

## **ARTICLE V - ELECTION**

SECTION 1. The annual election of the Board of Directors shall be held on the Belmont County Fairgrounds on Saturday during the Belmont County Fair from 10am until 2pm at a location to be announced.

SECTION 2. The President of the Society shall appoint 3 judges and 2 clerks who are members of the Society, but not candidates for election, to conduct the election of directors for the Society according to the Laws and Rules as set forth by the Ohio Department of Agriculture, and to declare the results thereof.

SECTION 3. The Annual election shall be by ballot. Ballots must be marked opposite the name of each candidate voted for:

SECTION 4. Only members of the Society, currently residents of Belmont County and with paid memberships, may vote at the annual election.

SECTION 5. Society members desiring to run as a candidate for the office of director must have attended at least three regular meetings of the Board of Directors during the current year. Society members must declare their candidacy for the office of director by filing with the secretary a petition signed by ten or more members of the society who are residents of Belmont County, Ohio, at least seven days before the annual election of directors is held. The official ballot shall contain only the names of the candidates who have signed the necessary petition and who have met the filing requirements to be eligible for the election as a director. Blank petitions shall be furnished by the Society and shall be obtained from the Secretary of the Society.

SECTION 6. Notice of the election, the filing requirements for the office of director and information as to how these may be fulfilled shall be announced in the annual premium list and twice in at least one newspaper of general circulation in Belmont County, Ohio, no earlier than six weeks and no later than two weeks before the election.

SECTION 7. The term of office of the retiring Directors shall expire and that of the Directors-elect begin at the October meeting of the Board of Directors.

## **ARTICLE VI - ANNUAL MEETING OF MEMBERSHIP**

SECTION 1. The annual meeting of the members of the Society shall be held at the appropriate site in Belmont County, Ohio, at the time fixed by the Board of Directors, which date shall not be later than Nov. 30.

SECTION 2. At the annual meeting, the officers and directors of the Society shall make reports to the membership of the Society concerning the past fair and make recommendations for the betterment of future fairs. The members shall be given opportunity to make suggestions and recommendations for the improvement of the Society and its fair. Such other business may be presented as may be prescribed by this Constitution or as may be deemed proper by the Board of Directors.

## ARTICLE VII-ORGANIZATION AND MEETINGS

SECTION 1. The Board of Directors shall meet immediately following the annual meeting and elect by ballot a President, Vice President, Secretary and Treasurer to serve one year terms (beginning Dec. 1 through Nov.30 each year) and until their successors are elected and qualified.

SECTION 2. All officers shall be members of the Society. The President and Vice President shall be directors. The Secretary and Treasurer may or may not be directors.

SECTION 3. Before the election of officers is conducted, the newly elected directors shall qualify by taking the following affirmation before a notary public: "I do solemnly affirm that I will support the Constitution of the United States, the Constitution of the State of Ohio, laws of Ohio and regulations of the Department of Agriculture of Ohio pertaining to Agricultural Societies and to the best of my ability perform the duties of Director of the Belmont County Agricultural Society, so help me God."

## **ARTICLE VIII - AMENDMENTS**

SECTION I. Amendments to the Constitution and By-Laws may be proposed by: (A) A majority of the vote of Directors at a scheduled meeting voting in favor of placing amendment on the ballot or (B) Filing a petition with the Secretary of the Society at least fourteen days prior to the annual meeting of the members of the Society.

Said petition must set forth a proposed amendment and be signed by not less than twenty-five members of the Society.

SECTION 2. If an amendment is proposed, it shall be submitted to the membership of the Society at the annual meeting of the membership of the Society.

SECTION 3. When more than one amendment shall be submitted at the same time, they shall be so submitted as to enable the members to vote on each amendment separately. Amendments shall be published in at least one newspaper of general circulation in Belmont County, Ohio, not less than three or more than ten days before they are to be voted on.

SECTION 4. If the majority of the membership voting on the proposed amendment shall adopt such amendment, it shall become a part of the Constitution and By-Laws.

## **ARTICLE IX - COMPENSATION**

SECTION 1. The compensation of Board members shall be fixed by the Board in accordance with the rules of the Ohio Department of Agriculture.

## **ARTICLE X - FAIR DATES**

SECTION 1. The Board of Directors shall set the dates for the annual exposition of the Society, subject to the approval of the Ohio Director of Agriculture.

ARTICLE XI - ADOPTION OF RULES

SECTION I. The rules governing the operation of County Agricultural Societies by the Ohio Department of Agriculture are hereby adopted.

## **BY-LAWS**

## **ARTICLE I - QUORUM**

SECTION 1. A majority of the members of the Board of Directors shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business.

## **ARTICLE II - MEETINGS**

SECTION 1. The regular meetings of the Board of Directors shall be held the fourth Thursday of each month at 8pm unless changed by a majority vote of directors.

SECTION 2. Meetings may be held when necessary, at the call of the President or at the call of the Secretary upon the written request to Secretary by not less than nine members of the Board of Directors.

SECTION 3. All members of the Board of Directors shall be notified of meetings at least two days before the meeting. The notice need not specify the purpose of the meeting.

SECTION 4. All meetings of the Board of Directors shall be conducted according to Roberts Rules of Order.

## **ARTICLE III - ORDER OF BUSINESS**

## SECTION 1.

1. Call to Order, 2. Pledge of Allegiance, 3. Roll Call, 4. Reading and Approval of Minutes, 5. Treasurer's Report, 6. Accounts Payable, 7. Report of Committees, 8. Report of Officers, 9. Unfinished Business,

10. New Business, 11. Appointments, 12. Adjournment.

SECTION 2. The order of business may be temporarily suspended at any meeting upon a majority vote of the Board of Directors.

## **ARTICLE IV- DUTIES OF OFFICERS**

SECTION 1. It shall be the duty of the President to preside at all meetings of the Board, to appoint committees, and to perform such other duties as are determined by the Board.

SECTION 2. It shall be the duty of the Vice President to assume all duties of the President in the event of his absence or vacancy of office and to perform such other duties as are determined by the Board.

SECTION 3. It shall be the duty of the Secretary to: (1) Keep a list of all members of the Society; (2) Keep accurately a record of all proceedings of the Society and the Board; (3) Notify all members of the Board of the time and place of all meetings; (4) Give the members of the Society notice of the time and place of the annual election of the Board of Directors and the annual meeting of the membership; (5) Keep strict account of all moneys that may come into his hands and pay the same over to the Treasurer and take his receipt therefore; (6) Make out the annual report to the Ohio Department of Agriculture and (7) Perform such other duties as are determined by the Board.

SECTION 4. It shall be the duty of the Treasurer to: (1) Receive all moneys and give a receipt for the same as to amounts and sources from which it came; (2) Keep a correct itemized account of all re-

ceipts and expenditures of money; (3) Countersign with the President, Vice President or Secretary checks for payment of funds by the Society; (4) Verify that Treasurer's Books are reconciled with bank statements monthly; (5) Provide monthly financial statement for each Board meeting; (6) Assist Secretary with annual report to the Ohio Department of Agriculture; and (7) Perform such other duties as are determined by the Board.

### **ARTICLE V - RULES**

SECTION 1. The Board of Directors may enact Rules and Regulations for conducting the business of the Society as long as they do not conflict with their Constitution or By-Laws, regulations of the Department of Agriculture, or laws of the State of Ohio.

SECTION 2. The Executive Board will consist of the president, vice president, secretary and treasurer. In addition, one director from each term limit will be elected to serve on the Executive Board. The Executive Board serves as a committee within the organization. The Executive Board has the authority to make decisions and insure that those decisions are carried out at the discretion of the Board of Directors.

## **ARTICLE VI - Auxiliary Board**

SECTION 1. The Belmont County Agricultural Society Auxiliary Board will consist of volunteers who have completed a successful background check: are recommended by a current board member and hold a current membership .They may serve on committees but no voting privileges granted.



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## Open Class Rules and Regulations for Exhibitors

## **ENTRIES**

- 1. All exhibitors shall be required to have all open class entries in the hands of the Fair Secretary, Becky Selmon, P.O. Box 704 St. Clairsville, OH 43950 and fees paid by 5 pm, Sat., Aug. 15, 2020. Entries may be made by mailing your entries and fees (postmarked on or before Aug. 15, 2020) or in person at the Secretary's office on the fairgrounds from 9 am to 5 pm on Fri., and Sat. Aug. 14 and 15. Late entries will be accepted at the discretion of the Secretary or Department Superintendent if space is available.
- **2.** All exhibitors must purchase a \$25 membership ticket (*if a resident of Belmont County and age 18 or over*) or a \$25 exhibitor ticket (*if not a resident of Belmont County and/or under age 18*). In addition, entry fees must be paid as listed in Department I, II and III.
- **3.** Entries once entered upon the books of the Secretary cannot be withdrawn for the purpose of entering the same in another section or class or in the same section or class.
  - 4. No refunds will be made on entries received.
- **5.** Members of the same family will not be permitted to compete for the same kind of article without paying an additional entry fee.
- **6.** Unless otherwise listed, no exhibit is to be entered in the name of any other than the bona fide owner.
- **7.** None but the department superintendent(s) of the Belmont County Agricultural Society will be permitted to examine the books before premiums are awarded.
- **8.** In order to protest an entry in either Open Class or Junior Fair, the following guidelines and procedures must be followed. (1) The protest must be submitted in writing to the Department Superintendent within 24 hours of action being protested. (2) Before any further action is taken, a \$50 deposit must accompany the written protest. (3) Immediate action will be taken after review of the protest first by Junior Fair Board of Directors (if a Junior Fair entry), then by the Belmont County Agricultural Society's Board of Directors Executive Committee and then by the Belmont County Agricultural Society Board of Directors for a final decision on the matter. (4) If protester is correct, the \$50 deposit will be returned. If protester is ruled incorrect, the \$50 deposit becomes the property of the Belmont County Agricultural Society.

## **EXHIBITS AND JUDGING**

- **1.** Exhibitors shall receive from the secretary a card or cards containing the number and class for entries made. This card(s) is required before exhibits are placed on fairgrounds.
- **2.** All livestock must be in place on the fairgrounds by 7 pm., Tues., Sept. 8, 2020. No animals or tack can be put in place before 5 pm., Sun., Sept. 6, 2020.
- **3.** All Domestic Arts, Horticulture and Grange exhibits must be in place by date and time listed in the rules of each department and/or section of the fair handbook.
- **4.** Livestock entries may be removed from 12 midnight Sat., Sept. 12 til 10 am Sun., Sept. 13. Any livestock remaining on the grounds at 10 am Sun., Sept. 13 must remain on the grounds until 5 p.m. Sun., Sept. 13. All other exhibits, including commercial and concession displays, must remain in place until 5 p.m., Sun., Sept. 13.
  - **5.** Any exhibitor in open class or junior fair will forfeit premiums

- and be barred from exhibition at the fair the following year if exhibit removal time is violated without approval of the Belmont County Agricultural Society Board of Directors.
- **6.** The Department Superintendents and Committees will take every precaution in their power for the preservation of all articles on exhibit after their arrival and arrangement on the grounds, but will not be responsible for loss or damage.
- **7.** When there is but one exhibitor of several animals or articles in the same class, first, second, or third premium will be awarded according to the merit of the exhibit.
- **8.** If animal or article is not deemed worthy of premium, the judge will not make the award.
  - **9.** The decision of the judge(s) is final.
- **10.** It is the duty of the Superintendent of the various departments to assist the awarding committee in finding the articles on exhibition and see that none shall be overlooked.

## ADDITIONAL RULES AND REGULATIONS FOR LIVESTOCK EXHIBITS

- **1.** No more than two entries per exhibitor in each of the single classes and no more than one entry per exhibitor in each of the group classes.
- **2.** No entries will be accepted after sufficient entries to fill all stalls and pens have been received.
- **3.** All exhibitors must give total head of livestock when making entries.
- **4.** The Department Superintendents reserve the right to take measures prior to assigning entries to pens or stalls during the fair that may be deemed necessary to protect the health of livestock shown at the fair.
  - **5.** Registration papers must be available upon request.
  - **6.** No bedding will be provided.
- 7. Livestock entries for herds bred under one general management cannot be shown by two owners, nor can two different breeders combine their stock for one exhibit.
- **8.** Any animal entered for exhibition in one class cannot compete for a premium in any other way except as one of a pair or herd.
- **9.** No person other than the officers of the Society, judges, exhibitors of the stock and invited guests will be permitted to enter the ring where stock is being exhibited, and these will have places assigned them by the Department Superintendents.
- **10.** The standard authority in all cases of pedigrees of livestock shall be the recognized "record" of such class or breed. All animals must be registered when shown for pure blood if they are of the proper age for registration.
- **11.** The Belmont County Agricultural Society's Board of Directors reserves the right to test for drugs or disqualify any and all animals at their discretion at the 2020 Belmont County Fair.
- **12.** All stalls are to be cleaned by the exhibitor following the removal of the animals.
  - **13.** Any violation of these regulations will forfeit premiums.
- **14.** Entry fees are as follows: \$5.00 per class for all beef and dairy cattle and \$2.50 per class for all goats except for championship classes.

- **15.** Five (5) Single Day Passes will be issued to each livestock exhibitor who exhibits 5 or more animals.
- **16.** All Inspection and Health Requirements of Livestock Exhibited in Ohio apply.

## 901:1-18-01 Chapter's Application

- (A) Animals listed in this chapter when moved or imported into Ohio for exhibition purposes only shall comply with the requirements of this chapter and when in compliance with the provisions of this chapter shall, with the exception of rules governing movement and importation of quarantined animals, be exempt from any other rules governing movement within or importation into Ohio.
- **(B)** Animals moved within or imported into Ohio for any purpose in addition to exhibition shall meet all movement and import requirements of Chapter 901:1-17 of the Administrative Code.


## 901:1-18-02 Definitions

As used in this chapter:

**(A)** "Exhibition" means any public show of animals which is sponsored by or under the control of an Ohio county or independent agricultural society organized under chapter 1711 of the Revised Code; or the Ohio State Fair; or which is assembled for a pe-

riod which exceeds thirty-six hours or contains animals of origins other than Ohio.

- **(B)** "Certificate of Veterinary Inspection" means a form from the state of origin which has been issued and completed by a licensed and accredited veterinarian attesting to the health status and identification of an animal listed thereon.
- **(C)** "Approved Veterinarian" means any licensed and accredited veterinarian approved by the Ohio Department of Agriculture, or an employee of the Ohio Department of Agriculture or the United States Department of Agriculture, Animal Plant Health Inspection Service, Veterinary Services.
- **(D)** "Licensed and Accredited Veterinarian" means a person who is licensed by the state of Ohio to practice veterinary medicine and who is certified by the United States Department of Agriculture, Animal Plant Health Inspection Service, Veterinary Services, to be an accredited veterinarian.
- **(E)** "Residue" means poisonous or deleterious pesticide governed by 40 C.F.R. 180, any poisonous or deleterious substance governed by 21 C.F.R. 109.6 or any other substance governed by 21 C.F.R. 556.
- **(F)** "Contagious or infectious disease" means any disease, including any foreign animal disease, or vector, capable of transmission by any means from a carrier animal to a human or to another animal and includes dangerously contagious or infectious diseases.
  - (G) "Tuberculosis accredited free herd" is one that has passed



at least two consecutive annual negative official tests for tuberculosis in accordance with the "Uniform Methods and Rules – Bovine Tuberculosis Eradication", and has no other evidence of bovine tuberculosis.

## 901:1-18-03 Exhibitions:

Sanitation, Inspection and Records

- **(A)** Each entity sponsoring an exhibition shall have in attendance an approved veterinarian for the duration of the exhibit.
  - **(B)** Each entity sponsoring an exhibition shall:
- (1) Immediately, prior to an exhibition and under the direction of the approved veterinarian, thoroughly clean and disinfect each building, pen, stall, ring or other enclosure in which animals are to be quartered for exhibition;
  - **(2)** Have the approved veterinarian:
- **(a)** Examine the certificate of veterinary inspection when required for an animal brought to the exhibition;
- **(b)** Inspect within a reasonable time of arrival each animal brought to the exhibit for symptoms of any infectious or contagious diseases:
- **(c)** Daily inspect each animal present at the exhibition for symptoms of infectious or contagious disease.
- (3) Maintain a record for one year from the date of the exhibition of each animal present at the exhibit. The record shall contain the name and address of the owner of each animal and the species and breed of the animal.
- **(4)** May order the immediate removal of any animal which in the opinion of the approved veterinarian places other animals at unacceptable risk of disease.
- (C) An exemption from the requirements of paragraph (B) (1) of this rule may be requested from the department and will be granted when, in the judgment of the department, cleaning and disinfection will serve no purpose. By way of example only, cleaning and disinfection will generally serve no purpose in a newly constructed building that has never been occupied.

## 901:1-18-04 Exhibitors

- **(A)** No person shall present for exhibition or exhibit an animal which he knows or has reason to suspect is affected with or has been exposed to a dangerously contagious or infectious disease or residue.
- **(B)** The owner or bailee of an animal with symptoms of an infectious or contagious disease shall, when directed by an exhibition official, the approved veterinarian, or an employee of the Ohio Department of Agriculture, immediately remove the animal from the exhibition premises.
- **(C)** Upon request, each person who presents for exhibition or exhibits an animal, shall make available any certificate of veterinary inspection, registration certificates, vaccination certificate, and other documents to exhibition officials, the approved veterinarian or an employee of the Ohio Department of Agriculture.
- **(D)** Each person who presents for exhibition or exhibits an animal for which a certificate of veterinary inspection is required by rules 901: 1-18-01 to 901:1-18-11 of the Administrative Code shall forward a copy of the certificate of veterinary inspection to the Ohio Department of Agriculture's Division of Animal Industry.

## 901:1-18-05 Poultry and Fowl

- (A) All turkeys, chickens and game birds moved within or imported into Ohio for exhibition must:
- (1) Originate directly from a flock or hatchery which is a participant in the national poultry improvement plan for the eradication of disease and be accompanied by documentary evidence that they meet the requirements of this paragraph; or
- (2) Originate directly from a flock which has had a negative test for pullorum/fowl typhoid disease within twelve months preceding the opening date of exhibition and be accompanied by documentary evidence that they meet the requirement of this paragraph; or
- (3) Have had a negative test for pullorum/fowl typhoid disease, within ninety days, preceding the opening date of the exhibition and be accompanied by documentary evidence that they meet the requirement of this paragraph; or
- **(4)** Be tested for pullorum/fowl typhoid disease upon arrival at the exhibition by a tester approved by the Ohio Department of Agriculture and found negative.
- **(B)**The rapid whole blood test shall not be used to test turkeys for compliance with the requirements of paragraphs **(A)(2),(A)(3)** and **(A)(4)** of this rule.
  - **(C)**Waterfowl, doves and pigeons are exempt from this rule.

### 901:1-18-06 Cattle

- (A) Cattle moved within Ohio for exhibition:
- (1) The animals presented for exhibition must show no symptoms or evidence of an infectious or contagious disease.
  - **(B)** All cattle imported into Ohio for exhibition must:
- (1) Be accompanied by a certificate of veterinary inspection issued within thirty days preceding the opening date of the exhibition;
- (2) Originate from a tuberculosis-accredited free herd, an accredited free state or zone, or a modified accredited advanced state or zone;
- (3) If originate from a modified accredited state or zone must comply with Rule 901:1-17-03 of the Administrative Code;
- **(4)** If originate from an accreditation preparatory or a non-accredited state or zone are prohibited from exhibition;
- **(5)** If from a brucellosis class A state or area/zone must be negative to an official brucellosis test within thirty days of the opening date of the exhibition unless: they are under six months of age, steers, or official vaccinates under twenty months of age *(dairy)* or twenty-four months of age *(beef)*; and
- **(6)** If from a brucellosis class B or C state or area/zone must meet all requirements for pre-entry testing as specified in 9 C.F. 78.9 and obtain an Ohio permit prior to movement.
- **(C)** Cattle from a brucellosis certified free herd or class free state or area/zone are not required to be brucellosis tested.

## 901:1-18-07 Goats

- **(A)** Goats moved within Ohio for exhibition: The animal presented for exhibition must show no symptoms or evidence of an infectious or contagious disease.
  - **(B)** Goats imported into Ohio for exhibition;
    - (1) Must be accompanied by a certificate of veterinary inspec-

tion issued within thirty days preceding the opening date of the exhibition;

- **(2)** The animal presented for exhibition must show no symptoms or evidence of an infectious or contagious disease; and
- (3) The owner and the veterinarian must attest to the following statement written on the certificate of veterinary inspection, "the goats in this shipment are not know to be under any movement restrictions because of "scrapie."
- **(4)** Originate from a tuberculosis accredited free herd as defined in rule 901-18-02 **(G)** of the Administrative Code for bovine tuberculosis eradication; or
- **(5)** Originate from a bovine accredited free state or zone, or a bovine modified accredited advanced state or zone; or
- **(6)** Originate from a bovine modified accredited state or zone must comply with Rule 901:1-17-06 of the Administrative Code.
- **(C)**If originate from a bovine accreditation preparatory or a bovine non-accredited state or zone are prohibited from exhibition.

(See additional information at end.)

## 901:1-18-08 Horses, Mules and Ponies

- **(A)** Horses, mules and ponies moved within Ohio for exhibition:
- (1) If not under quarantine and if they are free of any signs of a contagious or infectious disease; and (2) If the animal is twelve months of age or older, the exhibition manager may require that the animal has been tested and classed negative to an official test for equine infectious anemia within twelve months of the opening date of the exhibition.
  - **(B)** Horses, mules and ponies imported into Ohio for exhibition:
- (1) Shall be accompanied by an official certificate of veterinary inspection issued within thirty days of the opening date of the exhibition or obtain a permit for extended time granted by the chief of the division of animal industry as authorized in paragraph (C) of rule 901:1-17-01 of the Administrative Code; and
- (2) If the animal is twelve months of age or older, it shall be accompanied by evidence the animal was negative to an official test for equine infectious anemia within twelve months of the opening date of the exhibition; and
- (3) Upon request by an authorized representative of the Ohio Department of Agriculture, the person responsible for each animal must make available a chronological list of dates, places and events attended by this animal within thirty days prior to entry into Ohio.

## 901:1-18-09 Sheep

- **(A)** Sheep moved within Ohio for exhibition: The animal presented for exhibition must show no symptoms or evidence of an infectious or contagious disease.
  - **(B)** Sheep imported into Ohio for exhibition:
- (1) Must be accompanied by a certificate of veterinary inspection issued within thirty days preceding the opening date of the exhibition; and
- (2) The animal presented for exhibition must show no symptoms or evidence of an infectious or contagious disease; and
  - (3) The owner and the veterinarian must attest to the following statement written on the certificate of veterinary

inspection "the sheep in this shipment are not known to be under any movement restrictions because of "scrapie." (See additional information at end.)

## 901:1-18-10 Swine

- **(A)** Swine moved within Ohio for exhibition:
- (1) At a terminal show must: We are a partial terminal show.
- (a) Show no symptoms or evidence of an infectious or contagious disease; and
- **(b)** Originate from a county which sixty days prior to the exhibition opening date had no pseudorabies quarantined herds; and
- **(c)** Have no breeding swine present and all swine removed are delivered for immediate slaughter or to a licensed livestock facility.
- **(d)** Notwithstanding any other provisions of these rules, the manager or sponsor of the exhibition may, prior to permitting the exhibition of any porcine animal at a terminal show require proof, for example a VS form 4-33, animal disease diagnostic laboratory submission form, or a certificate of veterinary inspection, the animal has been tested and classed "negative" to an official test for pseudorabies within forty-five days immediately preceding the opening date of the exhibition.
- (2) At all other shows, must be accompanied by a certificate of veterinary inspection issued within forty-five days preceding the exhibition opening date; and must be negative to an official pseudorabies test within forty-five days of the exhibition opening date unless:
- (a) They originate immediately and directly from a pseudorabies qualified herd; or
  - **(b)** Are suckling pigs accompanying a negative dam; or
- **(c)** They originate from a pseudorabies vaccinated herd and meet the following conditions:
- (i) The herd has had a negative monitored test within twelve months, and
- (ii) The swine presented for show are negative to a pseudorabies differential test; or
- (3)Will be exempt from the requirement of a certificate of veterinary inspection if they originate immediately and directly from a stage V area and show no symptoms or evidence of an infectious or contagious disease.
- **(4)** Are exempted by a written permit issued by the department.
  - **(B)** Swine imported into Ohio for exhibition:
- (1) Must be accompanied by a certificate of veterinary inspection issued within thirty days preceding the exhibition opening date; and
- **(2)** Be negative to an official pseudorabies test within thirty days of the exhibition opening date unless:
- (a) They originate immediately and directly from a stage V area or from an area or country recognized by the United States Department of Agriculture, Animal Plant Health Inspection Service, Veterinary Services as pseudorabies free; or
- **(b)** They originate immediately and directly from a pseudorabies qualified herd and have not been previously exhibited this show season; or
  - (c) Are exempted by a written permit issued by the department.

- **(C)** Swine moved within or imported into Ohio for racing shall:
- (1) Be separated at all times from any other swine on the exhibition grounds by the greatest distance reasonably possible; and
- (2) Be accompanied by a certificate of veterinary inspection issued within thirty days preceding the opening date of the exhibition; and
- **(3)** Be negative to an official pseudorabies test within thirty days of the exhibition opening date unless:
- **(a)** They originate immediately and directly from a stage V area or from an area or country recognized by United States Department of Agriculture, Animal Plant Health Inspection Service, Veterinary Services as pseudorabies free; or
- **(b)** They originate immediately and directly from a pseudorabies qualified herd and have not been previously exhibited this show season:
  - **(c)** Are exempt by written permit issued by the department.
- (4) Be exempt from the immediate slaughter requirement of paragraph (A)(c) of this rule.

## 901:1-18-11 Llama

- **(A)** Llama moved within Ohio for exhibition when presented for exhibition must show no symptoms or evidence of an infectious or contagious disease.
  - **(B)** Llama imported into Ohio for exhibition:
- (1) Must be accompanied by a certificate of veterinary inspection issued within thirty days preceding the exhibition opening date.
- (2) When presented for exhibition must show no symptoms or evidence of contagious disease.

CHAPTER 901-19 OF THE ADMINISTRATIVE CODE *(OHIO'S LIVE-STOCK TAMPERING EXHIBITION RULES)* WILL BE MADE AVAILABLE TO A LIVESTOCK EXHIBITOR OR ADULT ADVISOR UPON REQUEST.

## SHEEP AND GOAT, EXHIBITION REQUIREMENTS

From The Ohio Department of Agriculture 2-21-02

In order for Ohio to maintain Consistent State Status, Ohio sheep and goat exhibitions will be considered Interstate Commerce.

A. Requirements for bringing sheep and goats into Ohio for exhi-

- bition, sale or breeding
- **1.** Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) issued within 30 days of the opening date of the exhibition.
- **2.** CVI must be signed by the owner and the veterinarian attesting to the following statement: "the sheep/goats in this shipment are not known to be under any movement restrictions because of "scrapie."
  - **3.** Show no evidence of infectious or contagious disease.
  - 4. All sheep and goats must be identified with

official USDA identification (USDA approved sheep tags, USDA approved tattoos, or identification in the Scrapie Flock Certification Program)

5. If the animal was born after Jan. 1, 2002,

it must have official USDA sheep/goat identification and be identified to the flock of birth.

- A. Identification requirements for sexually intact sheep and goats moving within Ohio for exhibition including sales
- **1.** Official USDA sheep/goat identification in the form or an approved tag or tattoo
- **2.** If the animal was born after January 1, 2002, it must have official USDA sheep/goat identification and be identified to the flock of birth by an eartag or tattoo placed by the owner of the flock of birth, or a tag or tattoo placed by the purchaser.
- **3.** The identification requirements for flocks enrolled in the Voluntary Scrapie Flock Certification Program qualify as official USDA identification for exhibition and interstate movement; no other special identification is needed.

Ohio sheep and goat wethers that are less than 18 months of age exhibited in Ohio do not require USDA identification.

- **B.** "Exhibition" means any public show of animals which is sponsored by or under the control of an Ohio county or independent agricultural society OR the Ohio State Fair OR which is assembled for a period which exceeds 36 hours OR contains animals of origins other than Ohio.
- Includes show lamb and goat sales, consignment sales of livestock and jackpot shows
  - **D.** Responsibilities of an exhibition sponsor (includes show lamb

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and goat sales, consignment sales of livestock and jackpot shows):

- **1.** Must have an approved veterinarian
- 2. Buildings, pens, stalls, rings and other enclosures in which animals are to be quartered for exhibition must be cleaned and disinfected prior to the exhibition under the direction of the approved veterinarian.
- **3.** The approved veterinarian is required to:
  - a. Examine CVI when required; and
  - **b.** Inspect livestock for infectious or contagious diseases within a reasonable time of arrival; and
  - c. Inspect livestock daily.
- 4. May order the immediate removal of any any animal which, in the opinion of the approved veterinarian, places other animals at unacceptable risk of disease.
- 5. Maintain a record for one year from the date of the exhibition of each animal present at the exhibit. Sheep and goat sale records must be kept for 5 years. (see (F) below)

**E.** For livestock purchased at an exhibition and moved out of state, an accredited veterinarian must issue a certificate of veteri-

nary inspection before the animal moves across the state line.

**F.** The Code of Federal Regulations requires that sheep and goat sale records be kept for 5 years by the seller, the buyer and the exhibition/sale sponsor. The records must contain the following information:

- **1.** Name and address of the seller, telephone number if available; and
- **2.** Name and address of the buyer, telephone number if available; and
- 3. Official identification when required as indicated in Part A and B of these requirements; and
- 4. Date of sale.

1 teaspoon baking powder
1/2 teaspoon kosher salt

1 teaspoon vanilla extract

**1.** Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Grease 9 x 5 inch loaf pan.

**2.** Place bananas into large plastic zipper bag, seal and smoosh the bananas with your fingers until very well smashed. Set the bananas aside. Place the brown sugar and butter into a mixing bowl, mix on medium speed with an electric mixer until light and fluffy, 1 to 2 minutes. Cut a corner from the plastic bag, and squeeze the mashed bananas into the bowl of brown sugar mixture. With the mixer on medium speed, beat in bananas, egg, cinnamon, vanilla extract, and milk until the mixture is well combined. Switch the mixer to low speed, and gently beat in flour, baking soda, baking powder and kosher salt just until the batter is smooth, about 1 minute. Spread the batter into a prepared loaf pan.

**3.** Bake in the preheated oven until the bread is set and lightly brown on top, about 50-55 minutes. A toothpick inserted into the center of the loaf should come out clean.

#### 2020 \* EVENT RULES AND REGULATIONS \*2020

Entry Fee - \$40 Welded Cars - \$50 Pit Passes - \$15

In the interest of safety, Drivers and Mechanics are subject to, and must obey, the following rules and regulations which are set up by the promoter and the track where this event is being held.

- 1. Each driver must sign and fill out an entry blank at the registration desk the day of the show. Every driver must have their driver's license at the time of registration, NO EXCEPTIONS. Every driver must have their car inspected at least one hour prior to show time, or a \$10 late fee may be imposed.
- **2.** All drivers must supply their own cars, only one entry per person. Proof of ownership may be required on each car entered.
- 3. All drivers and/or pit persons 16 or 17 years of age must have a notarized release signed by his or her parent or guardian. Nobody under 16 years of age can drive or be in pit area.
- **4.** All persons must sign the release sheet and receive a pit pass to be permitted in the pit area or on the track. Drivers only to receive a free pit pass upon registration; all other pit passes \$15.
- **5.** The track or promoter reserves the right to approve or reject any and all entries.

#### 6. ALL CARS will be inspected, so be LEGAL...

- 7. No drinking of alcoholic beverages is permitted on fairgrounds including on track, in the emergency vehicle area, or in the pit area. Any driver or pit person under the influence of alcohol or drugs will be immediately disqualified and removed from the grounds.
- 8. Any driver or crew member disobeying the rules will cause his or her car to be disqualified. Non-sportsman like conduct will not be tolerated and will be grounds for disqualification and barring from the future derbies. Drivers are responsible for the actions of their crew members.

9. All drivers must get out of their car for inspections. In addition, drivers must get out of their car when being inspected after heat and feature.

10. Top 3 cars will be reinspected on track.

THE DERBY WILL BE COMPOSED OF INDIVIDUAL HEATS AND ONE FEATURE GRAND PRIZE GOING TO THE WINNER OF THE FEATURE. DECISIONS OF THE OFFICIALS ARE FINAL. TYPES OF CARS

Any type of car or station wagon. No convertibles or hearses are allowed: Imperials are allowed. No Pre 67 unibody only. Any type of compact car with four (4) or six (6) cylinder motors. Maximum wheel base for any compact car is 113 inches. The wheel base for rear wheel drive and full frame cars should be 109 inches from center hub to hub.

#### PREPARATION OF CAR

- 1. Remove all glass, including windshields, side windows, rear windows, head and tail lights. Rolling windows down is not permitted.
- 2. All autos must be free of debris. No junk tires, wheels, metal parts, broken glass, ect. allowed in car.
- 3. Chrome molding strips and bottom portion of rear seats must be removed. On station wagons, all rear seats and deck lids must be removed. All fiberglass or plastic front header panels must be removed.
- 4. Any sharp or protruding fins or dangerous objects must be mashed down and/or cut off.

#### **GAS TANKS**

Stock gas tanks must be removed from the car. Only allowable gas tanks are metal boat tanks. Tanks must be placed in front of rear axel behind the driver's seat and covered with a metal protector. All gas tanks must be securely fastened to floor and covered. Gas lines and fittings to fuel tanks must be secured and leak proof. Only metal or rubber gas lines permitted. NO PLASIC LINES! Approximately six (6) gallons uel cells permitted.

Only one battery, any size is allowed. It must be placed on the floor-board of driver's compartment, securely fastened and covered.

Windshield area - a strong wire or nylon mesh screen is recommended on driver's window and windshield area.

#### **RUNNING**

- Safety belt, helmet, and goggles/safety glasses/face shields are RE-QUIRED.
- **2.** Pants of some kind, no shorts allowed. YOU WILL NOT RUN IF YOU HAVE SHORTS ON!!!
- 3. Sand Bagging and Teaming will not be tolerated.
- **4.** Separation of stuck cars at discretion of officials. (*Safety reasons or last* (2) *two cars running.*)
- 5. No deliberate head-on collisions and no deliberate driver's door collisions
- **6.** Vehicle must have dependable brakes at all times and boundaries must be observed.
- 7. No cars permitted in the competitions area before the heat in which they are to participate.
- 8. A vehicle will be disqualified if the driver's door comes open during
- **9.** One minute limit is enforced by the track officials for re-starts and making competitive contact with another car. Hits must be aggressive. Simple contact within the time limit does not constitute combat and could be considered sand bagging.
- **10.** All cars are to be removed from the fairgrounds or race track following the show or they will become the property of BCAS and the officials will have them removed. (*Unless otherwise specified at driver's meeting, a*

removal deposit may be required in some areas.)

- 11. A \$50 protest fee is required to contest another car. Protest must be made by another driver. No protests allowed after the drivers meeting.
- **12.** No riding on outside of cars anytime due to insurance regulations.
- 13. Boundaries must be observed at all times. Any car, shoved or driven out of bounds, or on or over a post or tire, may be immediately disqualified if Derby officials feel it is a safety hazard.
- 14. One warning on driver's door hit, second hit will result in disqualification.
- 15. All pink stick rules will applyfor all sand baggers. You will receive 1 warning; the second time will be a pink stick. This means you can be double or triple teamed.

#### **BUMPERS**

No special bumpers, reinforcements or trailer hitches permitted. Fender and bumper end may be trimmed to allow for tire clearance, bumper maximum 25" from bottom of bumper. Welding on front or rear bumper shock is permitted. No bolting sheet metal to bumpers. Welding front/rear bumper is permitted. Do not over weld bumpers or brackets. 1" wide welds on bumper shocks and brackets. Do not add more than 6" x 3" wide of metal to mount bumpers inside frame or outside.

Any factory bumpers. You may weld bumper to frame. Aftermarket bumpers allowed - DEC - Smith MetalWorks. Rear bumpers must be at 16" from ground! Aftermarket bumpers must be open on both ends.

Must run factory shocks, no square tubing or no shocks at all.

Compact cars - front wheel drive cars may have up to 3" square tubing or 3" pipe for rear axel. 2" tubing on control arms with working rear struts/shocks.

#### **SUSPENSION**

Cars with torsion bars may turn up. No locked suspension. No welding. May use spring block in coil springs. May weld top and bottom of coil spring to hold in. No putting leaf springs under coil spring cars. Any type tires permitted. Any 5 lug rear end must use factory control arms. May be lengthened or shortened to get correct pinion.

Any type motor or transmission permitted. Leaf spring cars must have arch in springs. Working factory shackles. 7 Spring 3/8"thick - 1" stagger 3" wide. 4 clamps per side - 5/16" with 4" wide - with 3/8" bolts. Steering may be altered from steering box to steering wheel. No transmission braces. Must use factortie-rods - may reinforce. No distributor protectors. No welded wheels.

Slider driveshafts permitted. Pinion brakes are allowed. Lower engine cradles only. No welding on rear end housing except spring perches. No axel savers.

03 and newer Fords will be allowed to use the old style steering box drag links, spindles, upper A arms and tie rods, NO ADDED METAL!!!! The FACTORY aluminum cradle MUST be used and MUST stay in the FACTORY LOCATION!!!! SMW 03+ engine mounting plate may be used. Your steering box must be mounted in the same manner as the car it came off of - NO EXCEPTIONS!!! Steering box must be bolted through the frame like the fatory intended it to be, the idler arm bolts may pass through 1 layer of the frame only or be welded NOT BOTH! All of the factory crush zones, holes must remain open and untouched.

#### **CHASSIS - FRAME**

No painted frames or undercoating. Sheet metal to metal....nothing welded to frame. No welding frames seams. No exceptions. Welding motor or transmission mounts are permitted. Welding rear end gears are permitted. No tilting of frames. All frames subject to be drilled.

Hump plates are permitted  $24 \times 1/4$  contour humps - outside with 46" fix it plates 1/4" thick on pre-run cars only.

You may patch rust on floorboards - trunk floors with sheet metal 1/8" thick. Trunk lid may be removed or bent down to trunk floor.

#### **BODY**

Body mounts 3 3" plates 1/4" thick. Not welded to floor or frame. May be changed - 3/8 bolt. No welding of body seams other than the driver's door. 1/4" - 4" wide - you may weld a 3" by 3" plate 1/4" thick on rest of doors. Spots per door - 3. Seam or band or wire bar across - behind seat and doors and halo bar are recommended. Inside drivers door only halo bar recommended. Halo bar may be inside car. Roll cage must be sheet metal only. 4.0 roll cage only rear bar must not exceed 6" beyond dor post or drivers seat. Nothing to frame. Drivers dorr may be plated or skinned. Body mounts must have 1/2 rubber between body and frame.

Gas tank protector 24" wide coming from rear bar behind driver's seat not tto touch floorboards. No bars from roof to trunk or speaker deck. Not to be welded or bolted to floor. Must come off rear bar. No wedging, crimping or tuckingof fresh cars. Body panels must be in stock position. No rolling sheet metal. Pre-run cars may be wedged. No bolting body panels.

#### **TRUNKS-HOODS**


May be banded or wired in 6 places to frame or bumpers. Washers to body to run banding or wire, only 3 strands per hold of No. 9 wire. Trunks and hoods may be banded or wired shut before inspection. 12 inch hold center of trunk must be 12 inch hold in hood or header holes. No welding on hood or trunk.

May attached halo bar to roof - 4 spots - band or wire only. NO WELDING!

#### **OPEN STREET DEISEL 2019 RULES**

- 1. This is an open street legal 4 x 4 truck class available to owners of trucks that are legal for highway use. If your truck is street legal and is built to the rules set forth herein, you can enter this class. Your registration papers are required to prove that the truck is licensed for street use in the state where licensed. A license plate with current sticker tag is required to be affixed to the truck. Registration paper, license plate and sticker tag must match. Trucks may be hauled to the pull. 8000lbs Chass.
- **2.** Motor changes that increase horsepower over and above the factory rated horsepower or that increase RPMs over and above factory rated range will be limited to changing of chips, air intake system (*K & N and other*) and exhaust systems. Only O.E.M. injection pumps allowed. T3T4T6 foot allowed stock intake shelf no pipe intakes.
- **3.** All tires must carry a D.O.T. number on the sidewall. No cut, altered or sharpened tires. Trucks with dual rear wheels (2wd or 4wd) may enter and run in this class. Maximum 102 inch width.
- **4.** Front bumpers must be UNALTERED if factory stock. No hanging weighted front devices are permitted but homemade bumpers, brush guards and winch brackets and brackets for snow plow frames are permitted. A truck is permitted to compete without any front bumper.
- 5. The hitch point will be from the rear bumper only or from a "REESE TYPE" Hitch on a level plane with the point of attachment to the truck's frame behind the pumpkin of the rear end. No other types of hitches are permitted. No angled, lever, pivot, axis other types of "TRICK" hitches are allowed and the hitch must be stationary in all directions. The hook point must be the furthest point to the back of the truck. Hook point must be past the bed of the truck if there is no bumper, or past the end of the bumper. Each truck must supply a twisted clevis that will accommodate a minimum of 3.75 inches across the

opening to accept sled hook. Hitch height will be 24".

\*\*2 x 8 turbo trucks must have all safety equipment\*\*

- **6.** No aluminum engine blocks are permitted unless O.E.M. No open headers will be allowed. Pump diesel is the only fuel permitted. Absolutely no alcohol, nitrous oxide propane or other oxygen extenders. Headers are approved. No superchargers are allowed. Engine swaps between manufacturers are not permitted. Duallies using gasoline as fuel may enter this class. Street legal gasoline trucks (unable to make weight for the 6200 lbs class) may enter with permission of officials.
- 7. No solid suspensions are permitted. Suspension must have a minimum of one inch of movement at all times. No blocks are allowed between axles housing and truck frame THAT WOULD RESTRICT the necessary one inch of movement. Lift kits are acceptable.
- **8.** Trucks must be stock in appearance. Floor in bed must be solid. The wheelbase must not be changed from original manufacturer. Wooden flatbeds are permitted. Weight in bed permitted. Full interior in cab.
- **9.** The transmission and transfer case must be O.E.M. and available in one ton *(or smaller)* pickup trucks.

#### 2.5 DIESEL TRUCK 6500 RUN WHAT YOU BRUNG TRUCK

#### 6500 STOCK MC RULES

- 1.6500 Pounds. Any added weight is to be in bed only.
- 2. Factory only intake and exhaust manifolds.
- 3. Reese style hitch 24" high maximum, furthest point on truck with easy access.
- 4. Any dot approved tire.
- **5.** Gas engines only with OEM HEADS.
- 6. No ladder bars or traction bars.
- 7. Spring stops allowed l" clearance minimum.
- **8.** Engine same make as truck.
- Registration to be presented at sign-up with matching license plates displayed.
- **10.** Vacuum secondary caruretors only. Fuel injection allowed if factory equipped for make and model of truck.

- 13. All water pumps, alternators and power steering pump. Must be belt driven by crankshaft unless otherwise OEM equipped for make and model.

#### CHEATER STOCK TRUCK

#### CHEATER STOCK 4X4 TRUCK RULES

- 1. Weight class is 6200lb. No weight brackets 01 hanging weights allowed on front. Weights must be in cab or bed only & securely fastened or contained safely therein. No weights allowed under hood or in the wheel wells. No weights may be suspended under the body/chassis or behind panels/parts.
- 2. No dual wheels, studded tires, tire chains, or any tire not specifically intended for street use are permitted. All tires must carry a D.O.T. # on the side wall. 0.0.T. # must be easily read from the outside of the tire. No cut, altered, or sharpened tires.
- **3.** Front bumpers must be unaltered factory stock. No weighted front devices are permitted this includes but is not limited to: homemade bumpers, brush guards, & winches. Lower brackets *(only)* for snow plow frames are permitted so long as no modifications that would add weight are determined. An unaltered decorative brush guard may be permitted at the option of the head official. A truck is permitted to compete without a front bumper.
- 4. The hitch point will be from a "Reese type hitch or drawbar w/ the point of

attachment to the truck's frame behind the pumpkin of the rear end. Hitch point may not be more than 24" from ground. No angled. lever, pivot, axis or , other types of 'trick' hitches are allowed & the hitch must be stationary in all directions. The hitch point from center of axle must be no shorter than 36" on regular cab trucks & 48" on extended and 4-door cab trucks. Shortening of the bed in order to shorten the hook point is not permitted. Traction bars are allowed.

**5.** Gasoline is the only fuel permitted. No aluminum engine blocks are permitted unless O.E.M. Absolutely no alcohol, nitrous oxide or other oxygen extenders. Turbo-Blue and CAM-2 are permitted. Headers are approved but all exhaust must run through a muffler system. No superchargers or turbochargers permitted. Swaps between manufacturers are not permitted.

**6.** No solid suspensions are permitted. Must have stock suspension one ton or below.

Blocks are allowed between axle housing & truck frame. Lift kits are acceptable.

7. Truck must be stock in appearance. Floor in bed must be solid. The wheelbase may r.iot be changed. Wooden flatbeds are permitted.

**8.** Transmission & transfer case must be O.E.M. and available in one ton (or smaller) pickup trucks. U-joint shields, driveshaft loops, and kill switch required.

9. Drivers are urged to wear a seatbelt or shoulder harness and a motor sport type helmet when hooked to the sled. Race seats with 5-point harness allowed. Passengers are not permitted in the truck unless first-time puller -limit 3 times.
10. A maximum of 3 working automotive batteries allowed.

11. Protest rule: \$500 for hidden weights. This must be done in one hour time limit.

12. Tractor & Truck pullers hitch opening size requirements: 3 ¾ inch front to back and 3 inch side to side. Note: No loose clevis are to be used. (*Revisea -Dec. 2017*)

13. Helmet/seat belt is required.

#### CHEATER STOCK TRUCK SAFETY RULES

1. Must have loops on all drive shafts and U-joint shields. 3 on rear and 2 on front

**2.** A working kill switch. Kill switch must be accessible to sled in plain view of sight. Kill switch must shut off fuel pump.



General Rules for Pedal Tractor Pulling

- 1. The event will be for children ages 4-12 years old.
- 2. Competitors that will be 12 years old the day of the pull may participate, but are not eligible for State Qualification if 13 before the National Pull in September.
- 3. The competitors will enter the division they are the day of the pull, including state and national. State and national will require proof of age and proper sanctioning paper work from lower meets.
- 4. Each participant must register prior to the starting of their age group.
- 5. Rules of Conduct by Participants:
  - A. The child may not place their hand on the tractor tire at any time during their pull to help increase their pulling distance.
  - B. The child may not place one or both feet on the ground to push their tractor forward.
  - C. There can be no loss of forward pressure. In other words, they can not hesitate or absolutely never jerk the equipment.
  - D. The child will remain in the seat at all times. If a contestant lifts off the seat, the pull will be stopped and their distance will be measured to that point.
  - E. All participants must be wearing shoes, no bare feet. (We would suggest tie or Velcro shoes that cover the foot and give traction to the pedal.)
- 6. Any arguing with the track officials by a contestant, parent or guardian will not be allowed and could result in disqualification of the contestant. We will display sportsmanship in all cases, and should that not be possible, the offender will be asked to leave. No one is perfect, but we will handle things in the proper way.
- 7. All rulings by track officials are final and may supersede any of the above rules. In the case of need, a sled may be reweighted and the group may start over.
- 8. Sanctioning: In Ohio, the Sanctioned pull will qualify the top three (3) in each age division4-11.

**Longbow:** Minimum draw weight 40 pounds. This includes compound bows and recurve bows. The arrow tip needs a minimum of two cutting edges, which may be exposed or unexposed and a minimum 3/4-inch width. Expandable and mechanical broadheads are legal.

**Crossbow:** Minimum draw weight 75 pounds. The arrow tip needs a minimum of two cutting edges, which may be exposed or unexposed and a minimum 3/4-inch width. Expandable and mechanical broadheads are legal.

#### Wild Turkey

**Longbow:** Minimum draw weight 40 pounds. This includes compound bows and recurve bows. The arrow tip needs to have a minimum of two cutting edges, which may be exposed or unexposed, and a minimum 3/4-inch width. Expandable and mechanical broadheads are legal.

**Crossbow:** Minimum draw weight no less than 75 pounds. The arrow tip needs to have a minimum of two cutting edges, which may be exposed or unexposed, and a minimum 3/4-inch width. Expandable and mechanical broadheads are legal.



# General Funior Fair Rules

- 1. No project is to be removed before release times listed (unless prior approval is given by the Junior Fair Board). Violation will result in forfeit of premiums and exclusion from exhibiting in Junior Fair the following year.
- 2. All trophy winners are required to turn in a "Thank You" note (addressed to their trophy sponsor) to the Junior Fair Board Office. Animal awards will be awarded at the end of each show, but will be returned to the Livestock Show Arena where they can be picked up after 9:00 a.m. on Saturday, provided a completed "Thank You" has been turned in at the Junior Fair Board Office. Still project trophies will be released to club advisors to put in club booths with still projects during booth set-up times, provided a completed "Thank You" has been turned in at the Junior Fair Board Office. Still project trophies released for club booths must remain in club booths until booths are released at 5:00 p.m. on Sunday. Still project trophies not released for club booths by the end of booth set-up on Tuesday will remain in the trophy case in the Livestock Show Arena. Still project trophies remaining in the trophy case all week will be released after 9:00 a.m. on Saturday provided a completed "Thank You" has been turned in at the Junior Fair Board Office. "Thank You" notes must be written and turned in to the Junior Fair Board Office before a trophy will be released. All trophies must be picked up from the Livestock Show Arena trophy case by 6:30 p.m. on Sunday. "Thank You" notes not written for trophies at the fair may be turned in to the Extension office after the fair, at which time the trophy will be released to the

recipient. Outstanding Project Knowledge (OPK) award "Thank You" notes will be given to organizational advisors with the OPK award. Organizational advisors are responsible for making sure youth complete their "Thank You" and submit it to the Junior Fair Office by 9:00 a.m. on Saturday.

- **3.** ALL Junior Fair premiums will be paid to club advisors after the close of the 2020 fair.
- **4.** In order to protest an entry in either Open Class or Junior Fair, the following guidelines and procedures must be followed.
- (1) The protest must be submitted in writing to the Department Superintendent within 24 hours of action being protested.
- (2) Before any further action is taken, a \$50 deposit must accompany the written protest.
- (3) Immediate action will be taken after review of the protest first by Junior Fair Board of Directors (if a Junior Fair entry), then by the Belmont County Agricultural Society's Board of Directors Executive Committee and then by the Belmont County Agricultural Society Board of Directors for a final decision on the matter.
- (4) If protestor is correct, the \$50 deposit will be returned. If protestor is ruled incorrect, the \$50 deposit becomes the property of the Belmont County Agricultural Society.
- (5) For all livestock entries, exhibitors must provide their own bedding, sawdust, chips or straw. Bedding will NOT be provided by the Senior Fair Board.

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#### DEPARTMENT 7 - LIVESTOCK

#### **GENERAL LIVESTOCK RULES**

All participants must follow Ohio Department of Agriculture Exhibition Rules, http://codes.ohio.gove/oac/901-19

ALL 4-H AND FFA MEMBERS ARE REQUIRED TO PARTICIPATE IN LIVE-STOCK SKILLATHON FOR THEIR ANIMAL PROJECT PRIOR TO THE FAIR. MEMBERS ARE NOTIFIED OF THIS SCHEDULE.

All Junior Fair Livestock must be in the possession of the exhibitor by each department's deadline date. The animal's housing location must be declared on each of the respective registration forms. Animals must be under the care of the member and can only be housed on the family's property. "Family" means the immediate family of an exhibitor, including but not limited to the exhibitor's parent, step-parent, foster parent, grandparent, step grandparent, foster grandparent, brother, sister, step-brother, step-sister, half-brother, half-sister, son, daughter, step-son, stepdaughter, or guardian. If a member is unable to keep their project animal on their property and do not have a "family" member that can keep their project animal, the member must complete a Housing Exception Form to be filled out and returned with the registration form. Each form will be considered by the Junior Fair Livestock Committee for approval. After each department's registration deadline date, random spot checks will be made by Senior Fair Board members and Junior Fair Livestock Committee members to assure that animals are tagged properly. Anyone knowingly switching or replacing animals after the possession date will be disqualified from showing or selling at the Belmont County Junior Fair during the current year. These random spot checks may occur until time of fair.

ALL MARKET LIVESTOCK AND LACTATING DAIRY CATTLE AND DAIRY GOATS ANIMAL EXHIBITORS MUST ATTEND A QUALITY ASSURANCE TRAINING SESSION TO BE ELIGIBLE TO EXHIBIT AND SELL AT THE BELMONT COUNTY FAIR. ALL BELMONT COUNTY YOUTH MUST HAVE LIVESTOCK QUALITY ASSURANCE CERTIFICATION BY JULY 1, 2020. ALL YOUTH EXHIBITING A MARKET OR LACTATING DAIRY CATTLE AND DAIRY GOAT ANIMAL MUST COMPLETE A DRUG USE NOTIFICATION FORM IN ORDER TO EXHIBIT AND SELL AT THE BELMONT COUNTY FAIR. THESE FORMS ARE TO BE TURNED IN AT THE WEIGH-INS ON TUESDAY OF THE FAIR.

Outstanding Project Knowledge Awards (OPK)

- \* Only youth who attend regular scheduled Livestock Skillathon are eligible for OPK.
- \* All members receiving a perfect score will be awarded OPK.
- \* The top 10% of total number of youth in specie area will receive an OPK.
- \* Jr. and Sr. categories will be used for scoring purposes in all species except swine which also has an intermediate category.
- \* Awards will be announced during each Junior Fair specie show.
- \*ALL LIVESTOCK EXHIBITORS ARE REQUIRED TO BRING AN UP-TO-DATE PROJECT BOOK, RECORDS INCLUDING A ONE PAGE REPORT TELLING WHAT YOU HAVE DONE AND LEARNED THROUGH YOUR PROJECT TO LIVESTOCK SKILLATHON.

#### Grooming

All clipping, grooming, and shearing must be done prior to animals arrival at the fairgrounds. No artificial color, adhesive, enhancers, etc. may be used in preparing market animals for the fair. Market animals should be washed and brushed only. **NO** Sleeves, Blankets, Ice packs Ice, Wet towels and Drenching is permitted. If anyone is found guilty of this offense, he/she will be penalized by being ineligible to show (including showmanship) and sell that species of animal the present year and will be ineligible to bring any animal to the fair the following year. 4-H/FFA members preparing for Breeding Classes will not be restricted from grooming or clipping their animals. It is required that the member be present and actively participating in preparing project animal(s) they are going to show. For clarification, see specifics rules that pertain to your species.

Per Fair weigh-in tag in – Youth may register up to 4 animals during pre-fair Weigh in tag in – youth may weigh, tag in 1 additional animal as a Family Animal, to be used by any family member Fair weigh-In EID (electronic identification) Tag are to remain on animal. Youth is responsible for removal of all tags

#### except EID, Federal tags and fair tags.

If an animal is weighed and it does not make weight:

\*Animal is taken off scale. \* Zero scale. \*No feed or water can be given to the animal. 
\*Animal must not leave area (DOES NOT go back to barn or trailer) \*Animal can then be weighed again-ONE TIME ONLY. Animals not making weight will be disqualified from showing in any market classes. All underweight animals may have the option to stay at the fair. If they stay at the fair, they must be shown in the showmanship classes, but they may not sell at the Junior Fair Livestock Sale, and must remain on the fairgrounds until specified release times (see Rule #5).

The Belmont Co. Agricultural Society (Senior Fairboard Directors) voted at the Feb. 2020 board meeting to ban the use of Ractopamine in all market hog projects at the 2020 Belmont Co. Fair from birth to slaughter. Several packers are testing for and rejecting market hogs that have been fed Ractopamine. The Fair Board Directors will be equiring all market hog exhibitors, and their parent/guardian, to sign an affidavit stating that the hog (s) exhibited/sold have never been exposed to Ractopamine. Affidavits will be turned in with DUNF forms, Belmont Co. Fair Board reserves the right to test hogs, feed, or equipment for traces of Ractopamine residual. See Fact Sheets for additional information.

#### **FOR 4-H & FFA MEMBERS**

 All Junior Fair livestock may also be entered in their respective open classes, if applicable. Open class entry form, must be sent to Becky Selmon, P.O. Box 704, St. Clairsville, OH 43950 – Secretary of the Senior Fair Board. Regular entry fees will be charged.

**2.** All Junior Fair livestock must be registered Livestock Skillathon and no later than 4:30 p.m., August 18, 2020 on forms available from the Ohio State

University Extension Office.

3. Regularly enrolled members of Belmont Co. 4-H clubs, organized and conducted under the supervision of the Ohio State University Extension and Belmont Co. FFA members

are eligible to exhibit in this department. A member must not have passed his/her 19th birthday on January 1, of the current year to be eligible. If individual livestock entries are submitted by the end of the fair entry grace period, members will not lose

individual livestock premiums.

**4.** All Junior Fair Market Animals, excluding rabbits and poultry, must be in place by Tuesday, September 8 by 8:00 a.m. All other Junior Fair Animal Exhibits must be in place by 7:00 p.m. Tuesday, September 8.

31. Only livestock entered in a bonafide market class will be eligible for sale.
32. In case of an emergency (flat-tire, accident, etc.) on your way to fair weigh-in, call the Senior Fair Board Office at 695-5059 to advise the Senior Fair Board Livestock Superintendent of your situation and let them know you will be late for weigh-in.

Situations will be reviewed by the Senior Fair Board Livestock Superintendent and Assistant Superintendent for approval.

33. All exhibitors must have all livestock removed and stalls cleaned by 6:30 p.m. on Sunday or fair premiums will be forfeited.

5. Livestock sold at auction that are being hauled by the livestock sale committee may leave the grounds from 12 midnight Fri. Sept. 11 thru 10 am Sat. Sept. 12. Other livestock sold at the auction and being hauled privately may leave the grounds between 7-10 a.m. on Sat. Sept. 12. Any animals not removed from the grounds during that time frame, must follow other animal release times which are as follows: All other livestock are permitted to leave the grounds between the hours of 12 am-10 am on Sunday Sept. 13. Any livestock not off the grounds by 10 am must remain on the fairgrounds and will be released at 5 pm on Sun. Sept. 13. Violation will result in the individual forfeiting his/her project premium and exclusion from exhibiting in Junior Fair the following year. Exhibitors are responsible for hauling animals donated back to them. Special traffic patterns will be posted at the fair to ensure a safe and efficient release of livestock during the early morning

release time. Conflicts about release times will be reviewed and ruled on by Senior Fair Board Livestock Superintendent and/or Assistant Superintendent. **6.** All animals must be shown by owner unless WRITTEN permission is given by the Extension Educator, for another Belmont Co. Junior Fair member to show animal. Except in the case where a member has 2 or more animals in the same class, then another Belmont Co. Junior Fair member may show the second animal without written permission.

7. NO assistance from adults, except in emergency. This also applies to showmanship classes. Each exhibitor is encouraged to fit their own animal. **8.** Animals to be replaced (*sick or die*):

a. Advisors must submit a signed statement of proof of loss.

**b.** Advisors must give approval before animal can be replaced.

c. No replacement will be given after the following dates:

\* June 1 - Steers \* July 15 - Lambs, Goats, and Hogs. \* August 1 - Rabbits and Poultry \*August 27 - Horses (must be replaced by registered replacement horse)

d. Veterinarian's statement must be given in case of sickness or death of an animal for replacement.

e. Animals can be purchased or replaced by another animal weighed in and owned by another sibling as a result of death of animal before replacement dates.

9. No animals or tack can be put in barns before Sun., Sept. 6, at 5 p.m. There is no restriction on when tack can be taken from the barn, but no vehicles can be driven up to the barn between 10 a.m. and 5 p.m. on any day.

10. Junior Fair stall assignments are assigned by Junior Fair Board Directors assigned to each barn department. Failure to house your animal(s) in assigned space will result in forfeit of premium. No stalls are to be switched unless done by a Junior Fair Board Director or Department Advisor.

11. Underweight and Overweight market animals will not be shown in market classes or sell at the fair.

12. Market animals are to remain in the care of the exhibitor until it is removed from the fairgrounds. ALL premiums will be forfeited for failure to feed and water animal daily and clean stall. In extreme cases, exhibitor may be banned from exhibiting the following year at the Belmont County Fair.

13. All Junior Fair livestock exhibitors are to clean stalls/pens to the ground before leaving the fairgrounds on Sunday evening.

Exhibitors must have their stall checked by a Junior Fair Board Director or Advisor, from their barn, before leaving. Failure to clean stalls/pens will result in forfeiture of Junior Fair livestock premiums.

**14.** All animals taken to the fair must be entered in a class.

15. All first place winners in all livestock classes, except horses, are to compete for Champion or Grand Champion. Remaining first place winners plus second place winner of class producing a Champion are to compete for Reserve Champion or Reserve Grand Champion.

16. All Grand Champion and Reserve Grand Champion market hogs, market steers and market lambs and market goats must go directly to a state inspected slaughter house or to the sale barn and then directly to a state inspected slaughter house.

17. Premium money will be paid to all Junior Fair Livestock exhibitors for

projects COMPLETED AND EXHIBITED. If a member has more than one animal in a project area, only one premium will be awarded except for breeding projects.

**18.** All Junior Fair Beef and Dairy Cattle must be secured with a neck rope. Failure to comply with this rule will mean the animal must be removed immediately from the fairgrounds.

19. All Junior Fair animals must comply with health regulations and requirements outlined in this book. Exhibitors must have health papers with them to show upon request to the fair veterinarians and at the judge's discretion. Check with your veterinarian.

20. If more than 10 entrants in Showmanship Classes, the class may be divided. 21. It is recommended that all Junior Fair exhibitors show animals be dressed in appropriate attire and be neat and clean in appearance. No advertisement of any kind will be allowed in the show ring.

22. Two Clean Stall ribbons will be awarded in each barn daily including show days. Winners receive a \$2 premium each time the award is won.

23. NO STRAW WILL BE FURNISHED FOR THE FAIR – YOU MUST FURNISH YOUR OWN BEDDING.

24. Only the current Junior, Intermediate, Senior Showmanship winners are eligible to compete in Master Showmanship. All Junior, Intermediate, Senior and Master Showmanship winners will return to their appropriate showmanship age division class the following year. All Junior, Intermediate, and Senior Showmanship Classes will be placed 1-3. The 1st – 3th place winner will each receive a rosette.

25. Members can show another person's animal in showmanship classes with the consent of the owner if there are unforeseen circumstances such as sickness of animal resulting in the animal being sent home, etc., and fair entry forms have been submitted to the Extension office by the deadline. (This rule does not pertain to horses).

26. Once an exhibitor enters a class with an animal for showmanship, he/she may not switch animals for the class.

27. All members competing in the State Fair events are strongly encouraged to compete in the county fair competition.

28. The official fair veterinarian will have the final decision in what are horns and what are scurs, and what stays on the fairgrounds and what is to be taken back home.

29. Livestock sold by private agreement MUST remain on the fairgrounds until specified release times on Sunday (see Rule #5).

**30.** Only livestock entered in a bonafide market class will be eligible for sale. 31. In case of an emergency (flat-tire, accident, etc.) on your way to fair weighin, call the Senior Fair Board Office at 695-5059 or 740-391-8218 to advise the Senior Fair Board Livestock Superintendent of your situation and let them know you will be late for weigh-in. Situations will be reviewed by the Senior Fair Board Livestock Superintendent and Assistant Superintendent for approval.

32. All exhibitors must have all livestock removed and stalls cleaned by 6:30 p.m. on Sunday or fair premiums will be forfeited.

#### FOR SHOW AND SALE

All clipping, grooming, and shearing must be done prior to animals arrival at the fairgrounds. No artificial color, adhesive, enhancers, etc. may be used in preparing market animals for the fairfor the fair. Market animals should be washed and brused only. If anyone is found guilty of this offense, he/she will be penalized by being ineligible to show (including showmanship) and sell that species of animal the present year and will be ineligible to bring any animal to the fair the following year. 4-H/FFA members preparing for Breeding Classes will not be restricted from grooming or clipping their animals. It is required that the members be present and actively participating in preparing project animal(s) they are going to show.

The Belmont Co. Agricultural Society (Senior Fairboard Directors) voted at the Feb. 2020 board meeting to ban the use of Ractopamine in all market hog projects at the 2020 Belmont Co. Fair from birth to slaughter. Several packers are testing for and rejecting market hogs that have been fed Ractopamine. The Fair Board Directors will be equiring all market hog exhibitors, and their parent/guardian, to sign an affidavit stating that the hog (s) exhibited/sold have never been exposed to Ractopamine. Affidavits will be turned in with DUNF forms. Belmont Co. Fair Board reserves the right to test hogs, feed, or equipment for traces of Ractopamine residual. See Fact Sheets for additional information.

## BELMONT COUNTY JUNIOR FAIR LIVESTOCK SALE COMMITTEE CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS

#### **CONSTITUTION**

#### Article I

The name of the organization shall be called "Belmont County Junior Fair Livestock Sale Committee".

#### Article II

The major purpose of the committee is to work with the Extension Educators and representatives of other youth organizations in helping to determine need and direction of the Junior Fair Livestock Sale by: 1. Assisting with planning, evaluating, recommending and carrying out activities as they relate to the Junior Fair Sale.

2. Seeking local financial resources and support, as needed, to conduct, promote and expand the Junior Fair Sale.

#### Article III

Officers of the committee shall be president, vice president, secretary and treasurer. The committee will meet in, March, June, August and October.

#### **BY-LAWS**

#### Article I

Two advisors and two members will represent each club participating in market livestock projects and will be elected by their club.

#### Article II

The officers of the committee shall be elected at the March meeting each year and shall be called the "Executive Committee".

#### **Article III**

The duties of the officers shall be: The PRESIDENT shall preside at all meetings of the committee and always have in mind the best interest of the committee; the VICE PRESIDENT shall perform the duties of the president in his absence: the SECRETARY shall keep a record of all proceedings of the committee and shall act as correspondent in matters pertaining to the business of the committee and the TREASURER shall receive and take care of all monies belonging to the committee and shall pay out upon order of the president and secretary and shall keep an accurate record of all receipts and expenditures.

#### Article IV

Committees for special purposes may be appointed by the President at any time.

The Executive Committee, under the advisement of the Extension Educators shall have decision making authority during the fair in regards to the Junior Fair Sale.

#### Article VI

Majority vote shall constitute an election.

#### Article VII

This constitution may be altered at any regular meeting of the Committee when due notice of such alteration or amendment shall have been given at a regular meeting preceding and passed by a two-thirds vote of the members present.

#### RULES

1. The Junior Fair Livestock Sale's Order of Sale will alternate annually with each species being sold in rotation within their time frame, 1:00 p.m. or 5 p.m. (With these exceptions: Feeder Calves; Beef Feeder Calves and Dairy Feeder Calves will alternate in sale order each year among themselves, which will always follow Steers; Turkeys, Broilers and Ducks will alternate in sale order each year among themselves. Any species goes to the bottom of rotation after being at the top.

**2020** – 1:00 p.m. Goats, Ducks, Rabbits, Turkeys, Broilers, Lambs 5:00 p.m. – Steers, Beef Feeder Calves, Dairy Feeder Calves, Hogs

2021 – 1:00 p.m. Rabbits, Turkeys, Broilers, Ducks, Lambs, Goats 5:00 p.m. – Hogs, Steers, Dairy Feeder Calves Beef Feeder Calves

2. Junior Fair show rules must have been followed. All animals that will be sold at the Junior Fair Sale must be registered by the end of the Sheep and Goat Shows on Tuesday, September 8 and the Swine Show on Wednesday, September 9. This information must be given to Extension Staff working the shows.

**3.** Grand Champion and Reserve Grand Champion Market Rabbit, Broilers, Ducks, Turkey, Hog, Goat, Steer, and Lamb animals must be sold in Junior Fair Livestock Sale. All Grand Champion and Reserve Grand Champion market hogs, market steers, market lambs and market goats must go directly to a state inspected slaughter house or to the sale barn and then directly to a state inspected slaughter house.

**4.** Junior Fair members may sell no more than two lots per person. The only exception is if an exhibitor has more than 2 Overall Grand or Reserve Grand Champion Animals.

**5.** No animal or lot allowed in sale ring more than once.

**6.** Animals not making weight will be disqualified from showing in any market class. All underweight and overweight animals, may have the option to stay at the fair. If they stay at the fair, they must be shown in showmanship classes (except market rabbits), but may not sell at the livestock sale and must remain on the fairgrounds until specified release times (see Department 8 – General Livestock Rule #5).

#### **STEERS**

1. Exhibitor may sell only one steer at Junior Fair Livestock Sale. Exhibitor will make decision on which animal to sell, if two animals were shown, immediately following the Steer Show. No changes may be made after giving Extension Staff your decision on which animal to sell. The only exception to this is if the exhibitor should have both the Overall Grand Champion and the Overall Reserve Grand Champion, then both sell.

2. Each market beef animal is to be sold individually.

#### LAMR

Only Market Lambs weighing between 95-150 pounds will be sold. **HOGS** 

Only Market Hogs between 220 – 300 pounds may sell.

#### FEEDER CALVES

Exhibitor may sell only one (1) feeder calf at the Junior Fair Livestock Sale. Exhibitor will make decision on which animal to sell; if two animals were shown. No changes may be made after giving Extension Staff your decision on which animal to sell. Only feeder calves between 300-750 will be sold.

#### **MARKET GOAT**

Only Market Goats between 60-120 pounds may sell at the Junior Fair Livestock Sale.

#### **BROILERS** (Pen of Three)

Market Broiler Pen must consist of four chickens of the same breed type. Youth will show a pen of three birds and sell all four. Limit one pen entry per exhibitor. Grand Champion and Reserve Grand Champion

must will sell and all other pen of Three Market Broilers. Buyers must make arrangements with youth on fair departure. Only Market Pens weighing between 24-32 pounds may sell.

#### **RABBITS** (Pen of Three Fryers)

Grand Champion and Reserve Grand Champion will sell and all other Pen of Three Market Fryers. Buyers must make arrangements with youth on fair departure. Only market pens between 9-15 pounds may sell.

#### **TURKEYS**

Grand Champion and Reserve Grand Champion will sell and all other turkeys. Buyers must make arrangements with youth on fair departure. Only Market Turkeys between 25-50 pounds may sell.

## MARKET DUCKS (Pen of Two)

Grand Champion and Reserve Grand Champion will sell and all other pen of two market ducks. Buyers must make arrangements with youth on fair departure. Only market pens between 10-20 may sell.

NOTICE: The buyers must leave animals on the fairgrounds until after 12:00 midnight, Friday. The care of the animals sold will be the responsibility of the individual selling until after the buyer removes the animal from the fairgrounds. See General Livestock Rule #6, page 53 for further release time rules.





Tuesday, September 8, 2020. All class divisions are determined using participant age as of January 1st of the current year.

## FOR SHOW AND SALE

All clipping, grooming, and shearing must be done prior to animals arrival at the fairgrounds. No artificial color, adhesive, enhancers, etc. may be used in preparing market animals for the fairfor the fair. Market animals should be washed and brused only. If anyone is found guilty of this offense, he/she will be penalized by being ineligible to show (including showmanship) and sell that species of animal the present year and will be ineligible to bring any animal to the fair the following year. 4-H/FFA members preparing for Breeding Classes will not be restricted from grooming or clipping their animals. ### RULES

- 1. The 4-H and FFA Horse Show is open to those members exhibiting their project during the full length of the fair, unless there is inadequate barn space.
- 2. IT IS MANDATORY to participate in Livestock Skillathon to participate at the fair (see General Livestock Rules).
- 3. IT IS MANDATORY to wear properly fitted protective headgear which meets or exceeds current ASTM/SEI standards with the chin harness securely fastened at all times while riding or driving an equine. PER STATE RULE BOOK - PAGE 9,#1 -- PROTECTIVE HEAD
- 4. IT IS MANDATORY to participate in Horse Camp weekend or at least 2 clinics, trainings or workouts provided by the Horse Committee With their project horse.
- 5. Encouragement Class entrants (1st and 2nd year horse exhibitor) will be evaluated on project book knowledge. Each participating member will show a simple showmanship pattern. The member and horse's appearance, grooming and general health of animal will also be considered. Participants will be graded, but no placing given. A grade ribbon will be awarded at time of show. HORSES WILL NOT BE LINED UP HEAD TO TAIL FOR SAFETY REASONS.
- **6.** A maximum of two horses per exhibitor, except in the case where a member is permitted to stall a draft horse team. Only one horse can be shown in each of the following categories: Performance, Production or Draft. If barn space is not available for all horse projects, exhibitor must designate at registration, May 15, which horse project the points will follow. Should a decision need to be made concerning stabling of an extra project horse, the Junior Fair Board and the 4-H Horse Committee will make a decision.
- 7. If a project horse becomes lame, injured, sick, or dies, it may be replaced, only by the registered backup horse, no later than August 27 (two weeks before horse show day). The 4-H'er must provide a veterinary statement to the 4-H Horse Committee and the OSU Extension office verifying this fact by August 27. If a vet, other than the official Belmont County Fair veterinarian, issues this statement, a copy of the statement must also be provided to the official fair veterinarian for approval.
- **8.** Each horse participant may register two horses per division by May 15 -- ONLY ONE HORSE PER DIVISION MAY PARTICIPATE at the county fair. Second horse may not be replaced.
- 9. Only one premium will be paid per project and that will be on the highest placing obtained at the County Junior Fair Show.
- 10. 4-H and FFA Horse Show will be judged using the State 4-H Uniform Rules for Horse Shows. (Copies can be obtained at the Extension office.)
- 11. Lease projects must follow regulations outlined in the state 4-H horse lease contract. Completed lease information is due to the Extension office by May 15 of the current year.
- 12. Production project must follow regulations outlined in the State 4-H Production contract. Production projects must list the name of the foal on the sign up sheets of May 15. Foals born after May 15 must list the name of the dam and sire on the sign up sheet.
- 13. Overall points for Year Round High Point Trophy are tallied from activities 4-H members participate in during the 4-H year.
- 14. Any items not covered by the above rules will be GUIDED by the Uniform Rules for 4-H Horse Shows available from the Extension office.

15. All equine must be under the restraint of its exhibitor and/ or parent/guardian at all times while outside of its stall. No horse shall be "loose" unless contained in its assigned horse stall. Read Department 8-General Livestock Rules.

## **ARENA RULES**

The following rules will be applied during the Belmont County Fair -- from the time of arrival until departing the fairgrounds.

## BOOK - PAGE 9,#1 – PROTECTIVE HEAD GEAR. 2. SUPERVISION

All Junior Fair members regardless of age or skill level must have a parent, 4-H, or FFA advisor present at all times. Individual clubs are encouraged to have supervision rules in place while riding or working your horse.

## 3. RIDING HOURS

- **a.** Contest/Pleasure Riding Hours: If you ride in both contest and pleasure classes and are registered in both, you can ride for 2 hours, then you must rest your horse for at least one hour.
- **b.** 6:00 a.m. to 10:45 p.m. (HORSES MUST BE IN THE BARN BY 11:00 P.M.) \*\* (EXCEPTION -- On show days, members may start exercising horses at 5:00 a.m.)
- c. Ride time allotment to be posted at Horse Barn during fair.
- **d.** Lights in the Horse Arena must be on after dusk.
- **e.** Due to dry weather, time in which to water down the arena will be designated. At which time, no horses will be permitted in the arena.
- 4. 4-H/FFA MEMBERS ARE NOT PERMITTED TO RIDE EACH OTHERS HORSES.
- 5. ALL HORSES MUST BE RIDDEN WITH A HEADSTALL WITH A LEGAL BRIDLE, BOSAL OR HACKAMORE

Junior Fair Poultry Weigh-In is at 7:30 p.m. on Tuesday, September 8, 2020. FOR SHOW AND SALE

All clipping, grooming, and shearing must be done prior to animals arrival at the fairgrounds. No artificial color, adhesive, enhancers, etc. may be used in preparing market animals for the fairfor the fair. Market animals should be washed and brushed only. If anyone is found guilty of this offense, he/she will be penalized by being ineligible to show (including showmanship) and sell that species of animal the present year and will be ineligible to bring any animal to the fair the following year. 4-H/FFA members preparing for Breeding Classes will not be restricted from grooming or clipping their animals. It is required that the members be present and actively participating in preparing project animal(s) they are going to show.

## POULTRY SHOWMANSHIP

All exhibitors should compete in showmanship classes according to their ages as of January 1 of the current year.

**a.** Senior Showmanship-16-19 years (as of 1/1/20). \*\*Senior Showman winner will compete for Master Showman.

**b.** Intermediate Showmanship -12-15 years (as of 1/1/20). \*\* Intermediate Showman winner will compete for Master Showman.

c. Junior Showmanship- 8-11 years (as of 1/1/20). \*\* Junior Showmanship winner will compete for Master Showman.

d. Master Showman -- All current Poultry Showmanship winners are eligible.

1. All exhibitors are required to participate in Livestock Skillathon and attend a Quality Assurance Training (see General Livestock Rules).

**2.** Market Broiler pen must consist of four chickens of the same breed type. Youth will show a pen of three birds and sell all four. Limit one pen entry per exhibitor.

3. All meat pens must be 6 weeks of age by fair.

**4.** All exhibitors must purchase their broilers through private means. Broilers should be in the possession of the exhibitor by July 25 of the current year.

4-H Club work is a voluntary educational program available to all boys and girls between the ages of 5 and in kindergarten and 19. The program is supervised by the Ohio State University Extension, The Ohio State University, the United States Department of Agriculture and Belmont County Board of Commissioners cooperating. 4-H members 8-19 years of age "learn by doing" by enrolling in and completing a project in animal science, clothing, communications, computers, conservation, consumer education, engineering, entomology, field and garden crops, flower gardening, personal development and leadership, photography, collecting, family life, health, nutrition, earth sciences, wood sciences, and plant sciences, etc. Kindergarten - second grade youth participate in Cloverbud clubs which does not encourage competition and fosters learning through group activities.

4-H member participation in the Belmont County Fair is a privilege and opportunity to share accomplishments, interests and ideals. Projects must be made during the current registration year and must have been completed solely to meet requirements of a 4-H project. Armbands to cover the cost of daily admission to the fair are available to youth who exhibit a project or display an animal at the fair. The cost is \$4.00 per registered 4-H member and \$8.00 per approved adult volunteer provided all registration information and

armband requests and fees are received by the Senior Fair Board Secretary by August 1, 2020 at 5:00 p.m. THERE WILL BE NO EXCEPTIONS. Armbands are to be requested for exhibitors and

approved volunteers through only one Junior Fair organization.

Exhibits show results of complete projects. Most 4-H projects are evaluated at county 4-H Project Judging prior to the county fair. County fair exhibits are on a voluntary basis for member's completed projects.

There are more than 750 boys and girls enrolled in the Belmont County Community 4-H clubs. Local volunteers are credited for the leadership development among these young people.

Each club is under the direction of two or more local 4-H approved volunteers.



## 4-H CLUB BOOTH EXHIBITS

- 1. Each 4-H club will exhibit their projects in individual clubbbooths. Club booths will be provided in the Jr Fair Building.
- 2. All entries are free. Booth Size Criteria points are assigned to projects, not members. 1 point for each livestock project and 3 points for each still project. Booth Committee members will assign booth sizes according to the point system. Advisors do not need to make booth requests.
- 3. Each club will select a theme consistent with the objectives, activities and accomplishments of 4-H. Decorations, project displays and educational messages should all incorporate or complement the overall theme.
- 4. Club exhibits must be completed and in place by 12:00 noon on Tuesday, September 8, 2020. The Jr Fair building will be open 10:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. on Sunday, September 6, 2020; Monday September 7, 2020 from 10:00 a.m.-5:00 p.m. and Tuesday, September 8, 2020 from 10:00 a.m. until noon for clubs to work on their exhibits. Exhibits must remain complete until 5:00 p.m. on Sunday, September 13, 2020. No project may be removed before release times listed. Violation will result in forfeit of club booth premium and the individual forfeits his/her project premium and exclusion from exhibiting in the Junior Fair for the following year. All booths must be removed by 6:30 p.m. Sunday.
- 5. Booths are supplied by the Belmont County 4-H Council. White paper will be available for club use, however, any color or type of material may be used. All other supplies and equipment needed for completing the displays must be furnished by the individual clubs. Exhibits should not extend above the structure of the booth.
- 6. No paint is to be used on any part of the booth structure.
- 7. The use of electricity is strictly forbidden.
- 8. Do not hang paper or backdrops from the building ceiling.
- 9. No perishable foods can be used in display. Use models or pictures. Models may not have real icing.
- 10. DO NOT USE NAILS OR SCREWS IN BOOTHS. Use tape, thumb tacks or staples. These must be removed when the exhibits are taken down at the end of the fair. Clean up and remove all materials. Clubs must remove all paper, take out staples, thumb tacks, etc. All paper and trash should be deposited in cans outside doors and areas in front of booth swept. Junior Fair Department Advisors MUST CHECK YOUR BOOTH BEFORE YOU LEAVE. Booth premiums will be forfeited if clean-up is not done correctly. All booths must be checked and approved for premiums to be awarded.
- 11. Space will be provided for oversized projects that do not fit into individual club booth exhibits.
- 12. For the convenience of advisors who act as organization advisor to more than one club, the clubs may combine their displays in one booth.
- 13. Each club member's name must be attractively displayed within the exhibit other than on the Junior Fair cards. Advisors names may also be displayed.
- 14. Club name must be prominently displayed within the booth.
- 15. Any club that uses a copyrighted ideas, i.e. Garfield, Pepsi, etc. must have written permission from the company.

In Girl Scouting, the girl always comes first. She is the main focus of the program, where everything is directed toward stimulating her interests and meeting her needs. Through membership in Girl Scouts, each girl, age 5 to 18, Daisy through Ambassador, who accepts the Girl Scout Promise and Law, is encouraged to reach her potential and to attain the self esteem and self confidence needed to succeed in the larger world. The message is, "Become your best, set your sites high. You can make it happen."

## FAIR PROJECT RULES AND GUIDELINES

## **Girl Scouts**

- 1. Girl Scouts consider participating in the Belmont County Fair a privilege and an opportunity to share interests, accomplishments and ideals. All entries must exhibit high quality in effort, originality and neatness. Entries should reflect, overall, the Girl Scout program and its ideals. Each girl's entry will be judged on its own merits and not against other entries. The age or program level of the Girl Scout and the degree of difficulty and skill will be noted.
- 2. Fair entries should be an outgrowth of a good Girl Scout program in a troop or camp, or showcasing the progress of each individual girl in pursuit of a hobby or interest. Projects must be made during the current registration year to be entered and must not have been entered in any previous Belmont County Fair.
- 3. Judging ribbons will be awarded to each entry brought to judging according to degree of excellence: First Class Excellent; Second Class Well Done; Third Class Good. The criteria will be "Is this an average, good or excellent job of workmanship and creativity? Does it reflect the Girl Scout Program?, How much did the girl learn or grow in doing her project?". A Girl Scout's satisfaction will be in knowing she did her very best.
- 4. Every registered Girl Scout (Daisy through Ambassador) and every registered Girl Scout Troop in Belmont County is eligible to enter through pre-registration. Pre-registration deadline is July 31, 2020, for individual, group and troop registrations. Armbands to cover the cost of daily admission to the fair are available at a cost of \$5 per registered Girl Scout and \$10 per registered adult troop leader (limit 2 leaders per troop) for those exhibiting projects in the fair, provided all registration information and armband fees are received by the Girl Scout Advisor to

the Junior Fair by July 31, 2020 and to the Senior Fair Board Secretary by August 1, 2020 by 5pm **THERE WILL BE NO EXCEPTIONS.** Armbands are to be requested for exhibitors and adult advisors through only one Junior Fair organization.

5. All entries, including booth entries, must be in place by 1:30 pm on judging day, which is Mon., Sept. 7, 2020, to be considered for a judging ribbon or booth award. All entries must be pre-registered prior to deadline (August 1, 2020). Items or booths displayed in Junior Fair brought after judging date and time will receive participation ribbons only. All projects must be in place by, Mon., Sept. 7, 2020 by 1:30pm for judging. 6. Each exhibitor is permitted to enter more than one project; however, only one judging ribbon will be awarded per exhibitor.

7. Group projects, entered in the fair by at least 3 girls working together in the same program level, will be considered and judged separately from individual projects, with a judging ribbon being awarded to the project and not to each individual working on that project. Scrapbooks or posters put together by adults are not eligible.

**8.** All entries, including group projects, must have 3"X5" entry judging cards attached to qualify for judging. The cards must contain the following information: Name(s), Troop Number, Level, Age(s), Project Name, Leader Name. Without this card attached, the entry will not be judged. Cards will be distributed to troop leaders by the Girl Scout Advisor to the Junior Fair once registration information is received.

**9.** Exhibits are under the supervision of competent persons at all times and every effort will be made to protect them from loss or damage. However, neither the management of the Belmont Co. Fair nor Girl Scouts U.S.A., will be responsible for any loss or damage to exhibits.

10. Exhibits must not be removed before 5pm on Sun., September 13; any troop or individual removing exhibits prior t that date and time will forfeit both premiums and ribbons awarded to the offending troop/individual and will be prohibited from exhibiting in Junior Fair the following year. Exhibit will be released only to the Girl Scout entering it or to her troop leader(s) as stated on the registration form. Exhibitors should be informed of this rule. THERE WILL BE NO EXCEPTIONS.

11. Special Instructions: ART ENTRIES - All painting, drawing, photographs, poetry, etc., must be of the original work of the girl submitting it. Murals that can be rolled will be exhibited only if space permits. All artwork, wall hangings and photography are to be matted or framed in some suitable form for exhibit, and ready to hang with wires, cords, etc., securely attached. COOKING ENTRIES - All exhibits must have recipes attached (ingredients and directions). Cakes and breads must be entered in whole and will be cut for judging. Cookies, candy or cupcakes must have at least 6 pieces submitted for judging. For displaying at the fair, items must have replica or picture of judged item on a paper plate with recipe attached. No perishable food can be used in display. SEW-ING OR WEARABLE CRAFT ENTRIES - All articles of wearing apparel, including jewelry or hair ornaments, must have a snapshot attached showing the article worn or modeled. POSTER ENTRIES - All poster exhibits may be no larger than 22"X 28".

## GIRL SCOUT BOOTH DISPLAYS

1. Each Service Unit in Belmont Co.may exhibit projects from Girl Scouts within their unit in a Service Unit booth in the Jr. Fair Building.

2. Booth space for the 2020 Belmont Co. Fair is being held for Service Units by the Girl Scout Advisor to the Jr. Fair Board and must be requested to the Ohio State University Extension Office by June 1, 2020. Size of space may vary according to number of projects to be exhibited.

3. Each Service Unit will select a theme consistent with objectives, activities and accomplishments of Girl Scouting in each of their respective communities. Service Unit name must be attractively displayed on the base of the booth. Exhibits will be judged against other Girl Scout Service Unit exhibits.

**4.** Booth exhibits must be complete and in place by 12 noon, Tues., Sept. 8, 2020. The Jr. Fair Building will be open from 1pm to 5pm on Sun., Sept. 6, and from 1pm to 5pm on Mon., Sept. 7, and from 10am to 12 noon on Tues., Sept. 8. (*Please note: These are Fair Board times and do not override the Girl Scout Judging Day deadline of 1:30pm on Mon., Sept. 7.*) Exhibits must remain complete until 5pm Sun., Sept. 13 Again, NO project is to be removed before release times listed. Violation will result in forfeit of troop booth premium.

5. Booths are constructed of bare plywood and should be covered with background material. White paper will be available for your use; however, any color or type of material may be used. All other supplies and equipment needed for completing displays must be furnished by the individual Service Unit.

**6.** Nothing may be hung from the ceiling and no paint is to be used on any part of the booth. The use of electricity is strictly forbidden.

7. DO NOT USE NAILS OR SCREWS IN BOOTHS. DO NOT STA-PLE PROJECTS TO YOUR BOOTH DISPLAY, JUDGES WILL BE HANDLING PROJECTS. Use tape, thumb tacks or staples. These MUST be removed when the exhibits are taken down at the end of the fair. All paper and trash should be deposited in cans outside doors, and area in front of booth is to be swept. Booth premiums will be forfeited if cleanup is not done properly. A Junior Fair Department Advisor must check your booth before you leave. All booths must be checked and approved for premiums to be awarded.

**8.** Space will be provided for oversized projects that do not fit into individual club booth exhibits.

**9.** Each club member's name must be attractively displayed within the exhibit other than on the Junior Fair cards.

**10.** Club name must be attractively displayed on the base of the booth.

## **BOOTH PREMIUMS**

1st, \$15; 2nd, \$12; 3rd, \$10; 4th, \$8; others \$5

- **1.** Boys Scouts, by packs, may exhibit their projects, crafts and camp projects as well as displays highlighting the basic components of the scouting program.
- **2.** To exhibit, the boy must be a registered Tiger or Cub Scout.
- **3.** A participation ribbon, attached to a 3X5 card, will accompany each entry, to be filled out by the den leader or pack leader.
- **4.** Booth exhibits must be complete and in place by 12 noon, Tues. Sept. 8, 2020. The Jr. Fair Building will be open from 1pm to 5pm on Sun., Sept. 6, and from 1pm to 5pm on Mon., Sept. 7, and from 10am to 12 noon on Tues., Sept. 8. Exhibits must remain complete until 5pm Sun., Sept. 13. NO project is to be removed before release times listed. Violation will result in forfeit of club booth premium.
- **5.** Each pack may arrange booth display according to individual booth themes. Theme of exhibit will be selected by exhibiting organization. Themes should stress values which organization deems most important to youth work. Theme should be incorporated throughout exhibit in telling the story of organization's purpose, goals, philosophy, activities and/or achievements.
- **6.** Booths are constructed of bare plywood and should be covered with background material. White paper will be available for use; however, any color or type of materials may be used. All other necessary supplies and equipment for completing displays are to be provided by each pack designing the booth.
- 7. Do not hang anything from the ceiling. The use of electricity is strictly forbidden.
- **8. DO NOT USE PAINT, NAILS OR SCREWS.** Thumb tacks, tape and staples are to be used and must be removed at the time of booth dismantling after the fair.
- **9.** All paper, staples, tape, etc. from dismantling displays MUST be deposited in trash bins at Junior Fair Building. Clean-up is mandatory for each booth space.
- **10.** All booths must be checked by Jr. Fair Dept. Advisor and approved before you leave. Failure to clean up booth or have your booth checked prior to leaving will result in the forfeit of booth premiums.
- **11.** Armbands to cover the cost of daily admission to the fair are available at a cost of \$4 per registered Boy Scout and \$8 per registered adult troop leader for those exhibiting projects in the fair, pro-

vided all registration information and armband fees are received by the Senior Fair Board Secretary by Aug. 1, 2020 by 5pm

**THERE WILL BE NO EXCEPTIONS.** Armbands are to be requested for exhibitors and adult volunteers through only one Junior Fair Organization.

- **12.** Space will be provided for oversized projects that do not fit into individual club booth exhibits.
- **13.** Each club member's name must be attractively displayed within the exhibit other than on the member's cards. Advisors names may also be displayed.
- **14.** Club name must be attractively displayed on the base of the booth.
- **15.** Booth exhibits will be judged according to the following point system:



## SHOWMAN OF SHOWMEN CONTEST

## **RULES/PROCEDURES**

- **1.** Open to Master Showmanship winners of current year. Second place Master Showman of species will participate if the Master Showman is unable to participate.
- **2.** Participants will show in class for each species except the species in which he/she is Master Showman. Species to participate will be: Beef, Dairy, Goats, Horse, Sheep, Swine, Poultry, and Rabbit.
- **3.** Master Showman from each species will be responsible for obtaining enough animals and equipment to show that species, to form a class of seven. Each Master Showman is responsible for having people available to assist in getting animals into show ring on schedule.
- **4.** The Master Showman of each species will serve as the judges. At completion of each class the Master Showman will give comments on the correct way to show the species.
- **5.** Each class will have 10 minutes to show.
- **6.** Participants should dress according to dress code for species of which he/ she is Master Showman.
- 7. Order of show: Rabbits, Poultry, Beef, Dairy, Hogs, Sheep, Goats,

and Horses.

- **8.** Participants will be placed from 1st 7th with points scored equal to placing.
- **9.** Scores will be kept confidential.
- ${f 10.}$  The participant with the lowest score will be the Showman of Showmen.
- **11.** Any disputes regarding this contest will be resolved by a committee of adults representing 4-H, FFA, Jr. Fair Board, Sr. Fair Board and the Showman of Showmen Committee Advisor. The protest procedure as listed under Junior Fair Rules, including the \$50 deposit will be followed.
- **12.** If a person wins the Showman of Showmen Contest once, they cannot participate in the contest again.
















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
