2023 * EVENT RULES AND REGULATIONS *2023

• Bumpers - Any aftermarket bumper permitted. ENDS MUST RE-MAIN OPEN. May be seam welded. Rear bumpers must be a factory bumper or removed completely. All after-market bumpers or homemade bumpers 1/4" thick with open ends 4" x 4" square tubing bumper permitted must be 4" x 4" 1/4".

Do not add more than 6 " x 4 " x 14" of metal to mount bumper to inside or outside of frame. 4" x 4" x 1/4" square tubing may be used for a front bumper weld only to frame. You may use 6" x 6" x 1/4" flat plate to your bumper and to the frame mount. May use factory bumper cover over your 4" square tubing.

- Chassis Frame No undercoating and no painting; just your fixa-plates. No seam welding. No tilting. No cold bending of frames. You may patch rusty floorboards with 1/8" steel.
- Fix-A-Plates You may have four 4" x 4" x 1/4" plates to any pre-run or fresh car. Plates must be 4" apart and must also be painted white. Fix-aplate must be flat on frame. Do not use plate to create a gusset!
- Tires You may run any tire on a stock appearing rim. Tire must hold air. Nothing welded to outside of rim other than a valve stem protector. Weld in centers are permitted. No bead lock rims.
- Body Driver's door may be welded solid. You may skin the door. All other doors may use 4" x 4" x 1/4" plates weld 4 per seam only. All plates must be below top of door. You may use 4" x 4" x 14" plate on trunk and hood welded to trunk or hood to run band or wire through. Do not weld these plates over the seam. 8 hood – 8 trunk. Body bolts may be changed 4" x 4" 1/4" plates may be used. Do not weld these plate 1/2" bolts may be used.

Body panels may be creased, not crimped. All panels must remain factory height. You may dip your trunk lid but must remain at least 6" from trunk floor. A 2" x 2" x 1/4" piece of square tubing or pipe may be used to weld from roof to speaker deck. You may use 4" x 4" x 1/4" plate for mounting. You may short shock by using 1" all thread. You may use 1" all thread to run through your core support from bottom of frame to top of your hood. This will count as one of your securement spots in front. 4" x 4" x 1/4" plates may be used. Nothing welded to outside of core support. You may bolt in wire – screen with 3/8" bolts only. No bolting body panels. You may run rear window bar from roof or halo bar to speaker tray - not trunk lid.

- Motor and Transmission Any motor and transmission combination allowed. You may run lower cradle with a bolt in the distributor protector. If you choose not to run distributor protector, you may run two 2" x 2" x 1/4" kickers from the dash bar to back of A-Arm 1 per side. If you use a plate to mount your kicker to frame it must be 4" x 4" x 1/4". No transmission braces. You may run steel bell housing. You may use slider shaft. You may use pinion brake.
- Suspension (one or the other) You may convert coil spring cars to leaf spring. You may run 9 flat leaves no bigger than 3/8" thick. You must have 2-1/2" wide 1" stagger. You may have 4 clamps per side. You may use 4" x 4" x 1/4" plates for clamps. Nothing over 1/2" bolts or clamps. Spring perches no bigger than 6". Must have working rear shackle.

You may hump plate. Plates must not exceed 32". Must be contour to frame. Flat No V-plates. Your choice – one or the other, not both!

A-Arms may be welded by using 4" x4" x 1/4" plate on one side only. All factory parts must be used. You may reinforce tie-rod ends.

Rear ends - You may use any factory rear end. Any other factory rear end permitted. Must use factor control arms. May lengthen or shorten to get pinion angle. No braces anywhere on rear end.

- Gas Tank Protector Must be no wider than 24". Must be mounted to rear bar behind seat. Must be floating, not attached to any part of car. No plastic gas tanks. No plastic gas liners. Gas liners must be on side of car.
- Trucks Hoods May be wired or banded in 8 spots (6 to frame and 2 to bumpers). You may weld 8 4" x4" x 14" plates to wire or band plates. Must be1/4" from edge of trunk, quarter panel seams on hood must be same. Hoods will be open for inspection. Hole in trunk not required.







- 1. Must be 4 or 6 cylinder compact car. Rear wheel drive cars 109" wheelbase/front wheel drive cars 113" wheelbase center hub to center hub.
- 2. Car must be completely stripped, no windshields.

Rear window bar permitted from roof of halo bar to speaker deck no trunk lid (expect station wagons or mini vans).
- **8.** Battery must be moved to the passenger floorboard secured and covered.

• Must have loops on all drive shafts and U-joint shields. 3 on rear and 2 on front. A working kill switch. Kill switch must be accessible to the sled in plain view of sight. Kill switch must shut off fuel pump. Must have neutral safety "white" light visible by the sled operator. Must have a fire extinguisher within hand reach. Blow proof bell housing or blanket and flywheel shields are insurance required. Must wear a helmet. No hot rodding in pit area. Driver use of a race seat with five-point harness recommended. Fire proof clothing (gloves, shoes, jacket, pants) recommended.

8500 pound Open Diesel Trucks

ENGINE Motor changes that increase horsepower over and above the factory rated horsepower or that increase RPMs over and above factory rated range will be limited to changing of chips, air intake system (K & N and other) and exhaust systems. Must run OEM cylinder head and OEM blocks. No aftermarket permitted. The use of two (2) high pressure common rail fuel pumps is legal. The use of only one (1) P pump up to P7100 allowed. 13MM plunger limit. Ag governors are permitted. Pump diesel is the only fuel permitted. Absolutely no alcohol, nitrousoxide, propane or other oxygen extenders. No superchargers allowed. Engine swaps between manufacturers are not permitted. Duallys using gasoline as fuel may enter this class. Street legal gasoline trucks (unable to make weight for the 6200lb class) may enter with permission of officials. Only single turbo charger allowed, unless factory OEM equipped .Charger must slug 2.8.

EXHAUST All vehicles must be equipped with upward pointing exhaust or if exhaust runs to the rear of the truck it must be equipped with a turn up elbow. Two (2) 3/8" diameter bolts must be placed through the exhaust pipe in a cross pattern within one (1) inch of each other and within twelve (12) inches of the turbo.

TIRES All tires must carry a D.O.T. number on the sidewall. No cut, altered or sharpened tires. Trucks with dual rear wheels (2wd or 4wd) may enter and run in this class. Maximum 102 inch width.

BUMPERS Front bumpers must be UNALTERED if factory stock. No hanging weighted front devices are permitted. Homemade bumpers, brush guards and winch brackets and brackets for snow plow frames are permitted. A truck is permitted to compete without any front bumper.

HITCH The hitch point will be from the rear bumper or from a "RE-ESE TYPE" hitch on a level plane with the point of attachment to the truck's frame at the center of the pumpkin of the rear end. No other types of hitches are permitted. No angled, lever, pivot, axis, or other types of "TRICK" hitches are allowed and the hitch must be stationary in all directions. The hook point must be the furthest point to the back of the truck. Hook point must be past the bed of the truck if there is no bumper, or past the end of the bumper. Each truck must supply a hitch with a 3" x 3 ¾" hole to accept sled hook. No clevis of any kind accepted. Hitch height will be 26"maximum.

SUSPENSION No solid suspensions are permitted. Suspensions must have a minimum of one inch of movement at all times. OEM chassis is mandatory. The vehicle must retain OEM frame rails. Traction bars and devices are permitted. Must be bolt on only. Welds permitted for attachment to frame and axle only. Lift kits are acceptable. No weights permitted in cab of truck. Weights must be secured in the bed of the truck.

BRAKES Must have working brakes. No pinion brakes allowed.

APPEARANCE Trucks must be in stock appearance. Floor in bed must be solid. The wheel base must not be changed from original manufacturer. Flatbeds are permitted. Interior in cab must be OEM. No race seats or gutted cabs permitted.

DRIVETRAIN The transmission, transfer case, front and back rear end must all be OEM and available in one ton (or smaller) pickup trucks. All trucks must have at least a six-inch-wide u-joint shield around all u-joints constructed of at least 5/16" steel or 3/8" aluminum that will safely contain the u-joint and the end of the driveshaft. All shields must be securely mounted to the vehicle. Axle shields are required. Shield must be .060" thickness steel or aluminum.

SAFETY Safety switches (rain cap or guillotine style) must shut off air to diesel engines. Switch will be securely mounted to the back of the vehicle. A 2 inch or bigger solid ring must be attached to the end of the switch. Ring must be zip tied to the switch bracket. Switch must also be able to be activated in the cab while the driver is secured in the vehicle.

FIRE EXTINGUISHER All vehicles must have a 2 ½lb dry chemical extinguisher. Must be securely mounted within reach of the driver.

DRESS CODE D.O.T. helmet to be worn and fastened. Leather shoes or fire shoes are required. Must wear pants and shirt at all times. Fire suits and gloves are highly recommended.

8200 pound Workstock Diesel Trucks

- 26. 6.4 Power stroke must retain factory turbo with factory intake wheels.
- 27. T-3 flange only.
- 28. Trucks must run stock wheelbase.
- 29. Stock or OEM replacement, no water to air intercoolers.

6200 pound Modified Stock Gas 4x4 Trucks

- 1. 6200 pounds max weight.
- 2. Racing gasoline only. No power additives of any kind. No Nitrous Oxide, alcohol, or Nitro, etc.
- 3. Engine must be the same make of truck. Engine center-line rule: center of axle to bellhousing to be at least 12 inches. Any internal modifications to the engine are allowed.
- 4. 472 Cubic Inch Limit Max +/-2%. To be checked with a pump. Must be checked and tagged before 2nd pull.
- 5. Dry sump oil systems are not allowed.
- 6. One single carburetor (4150 or equal) no-dominators.
- 7. Aluminum intakes allowed (cast only). No external modifications. Maximum of 2" spacer between carb and intake. No tunnel rams or sheet metal intakes.
- 8. Aftermarket heads allowed. Must be cast iron blocks and heads. No aluminum heads or blocks.
- 9. Open headers allowed.
- 10. Must have alternator; alternator must be driven by crank.
- 11. Electric fuel pumps allowed. One fuel pump total. No belt drive pumps allowed.
- 12. Electric fans and water pumps are allowed.
- 13. Front end and rear end no larger than 1 ton.
- 14. Transmission and transfer case must be OEM style of truck. No Pro-

- Fabs.
- 15. Must have loops on all drive shafts and U-joint shields. 3 on rear and 2 on front.
- 16. Must have a working kill switch. Kill switch must be accessible to the sled in plain view of sight. Kill switch must shut off the fuel pump and ignition.
- 17. Must have Neutral safety "white" light visible by sled the operator.
- 18. Must have a fire extinguisher within hand reach.
- 19. Blow proof bell housing or blanket and flywheel shields are insurance required.
- 20. Driver use of a race seat with five point harness recommended.
- 21. Must have all factory sheet metal. No fiberglass or aluminum body parts (exception fiberglass hood allowed). Hood scoops are allowed. Do not have to have a tailgate on the truck.
- 22. Maximum wheelbase is 135 inches.
- 23. Full factory stock bed-No flatbeds or aluminum beds.
- 24. No extended cabs.
- 25. Inner fenders must be in the truck in stock location.
- 26. Gas tanks must be in factory position or fuel cell only in the bed of the truck or on a weight box.
- 27. Must have at least 1 OEM style shock per wheel.
- 28. Rear brakes are an option.
- 29. One battery must be secured under the hood.
- 30. Stops must be in the center of the axle housing. No solid suspensions. Springs must have a minimum of 5 working leaves on each side. Springs must be in a factory location.
- 31. Ladder bars may not extend past the front of the bed on the rear or past the front cab mount of the front.
- 32. Maximum of 33x12.50 DOT tires mounted on maximum 10" wide rims. No cut or sharpened tires. Allow only (4) tires.
- 33. Front weights may not extend more than 195 inches from the centerline of the rear axle to the furthest point.
- 34. Hitch will be 24" high maximum. No less than 36" from center of the rear axle to hook point. Hitch must fasten to frame only and adjust off the frame ONLY. All bracing must hook to frame or stops that come off of frame ONLY. Hitch opening size 3 ¾ inch front to back and 3 inch side to side.

6200 pound Pro Stock 4x4 Gas Trucks

- 1. 6200 pounds max weight.
- 2. Front weights may not extend more than 195 inches from the centerline of the rear axle to the furthest point. Weights may not extend more than 60 inches from centerline of front axle.

- 22. Helmet, fire jacket and gloves are mandatory. No tennis shoes or open toes. Fire proof boots recommended.

- 6. Hook point to be no closer than 44" of centerline of rear axle. Maximum hitch height of 24" with a minimum of 3.75" x3" opening. Hitch must be stationary in all directions. Hitch must be frame mounted. The use of Reese style hitches is prohibited. Hitch must be centerline of the rear axle or behind. Hitch must not exceed 25 degree angle from pivot point to hook point. Drawbar height adjustment link if attached to rear differential housing the attaching point must be at axle centerline or below. The drawbar adjusters cannot attach to anything above the centerline of the rear axle. The adjusters must go down from the drawbar. The adjusters can only go straight downward vertically or towards rear differential housing. No slotting of holes for adjuster attachment. No hitch supports or adjusters fastened to rear axle housing shall be above the center point of the rear axle. Pivot pin of the drawbar can be no further forward than the centerline of the rear axle.
- 7. Turbo is limited to a 2.6" inducer bore. Bore must be smooth. No MAP Width Enhancement groove (MWE) allowed. Compressor wheel must protrude into 2.6" bore for 1/8". Bore will be checked with a 2.605"turbo plug. Plug must not be able to enter the inducer bore and

contact wheel.

- 8. All vehicles must be equipped with upward pointing exhaust located either directly behind the cab or out of the truck hood. Two 3/8 inch diameter bolts must be placed through the exhaust pipe in a cross pattern within one inch of each other and within 12 inches of the turbo.
- 9. Front hanging weights are allowed, not to exceed 60 inches forward from the centerline of the front axle. Ballast may be added in the bed of the truck but must be securely fastened. Maximum weight 8000 pounds.
- 10. All trucks must have at least a six-inch-wide u-joint shield around the rear u-joint constructed of at least 5/16-inch steel or 3/8 aluminum that will safely contain the u-joint and the end of the driveshaft. All shields must be securely mounted to the vehicle. Any front shaft u-joints that can be visibly seen from the side of the truck must be shielded to contain the u-joint and the end of the driveshaft.
- 11. A fire extinguisher system is permitted. 2.5# fire extinguisher must be securely mounted within reach of the driver. A complete OEM firewall is required.
- 12. All drivers must have a valid driver license and full SFI fire suit including helmet. Seat Belt/restraint must be worn.
- 13. The complete OEM floor pan is mandatory. Vehicle must maintain a complete firewall. Additional gauges and pillar pods are permitted.
- 14. Hand throttles permitted. Diesel fuel only (See fuels page for specs) No propane or N02 or any other oxygen enhancers allowed
- 15. Maximum of one P pump up to P7100 allowed. 13MM plunger limit. Ag governors permitted. The use of multiple high pressure common rail fuel pumps is legal.
- 16. OEM rear and front ends required. Must have come factory in a one ton or smaller vehicle.
- $17.\ Axle$ shields are required. Shield to be .060" thickness steel or aluminum. A hole may be

cut in one shield to allow operation of hub lock.

- 18. Safety switches (rain cap or guillotine) must shut off air to diesel engines. Switch will be securely mounted to the back of the vehicle. A 2 inch or bigger solid ring must be attached to the end of the switch. Ring must be zip tied to the switch bracket. Switch must also be able to be activated in the cab while the driver is secured in the vehicle.
- 19. Hydraulic steering permitted.
- 20. Suspension The upper mounting point for strut assembly must be in factory location. Adjustable caster/ 60 camber pillow ball mounts are permitted. The lower control arm may be strengthened provided the factory mounting points are maintained. Strut tower braces, lower tie bars, sway bars, and limit straps are permitted. Traction bars and devices are permitted. Raising or lowering of vehicle height with suspension modifications is permitted but must be bolted on only. Welds permitted for attachment to frame and axle only. Blocked suspension permitted. No air bags. Rear suspension may be made solid.
- 21. Tires must be DOT approved with a maximum size of 35x12.50. No studded tires or tire chains. No alterations to tires permitted. No bar or terra tires.
- 22. Dual wheels are prohibited.
- 23. OEM transmission and transfer case must be used. Must have come factory in a one ton or smaller vehicle.
- 24. Non-OEM transmissions prohibited. Aftermarket torque converters, valve bodies, and internal components are permitted.
- 25. SFI bell housing and/or SFI blow proof bell housing or SFI blanket type shield must be used.
- 26. Water injection is prohibited. Air to air intercooler only. No ice or water permitted.

General Rules for Pedal Tractor Pulling

- 1. The event will be for children ages 4-12 years old.
- 2. Competitors that will be 12 years old the day of the pull may participate, but are not eligible for State Qualification if 13 before the National Pull in September.
- 3. The competitors will enter the division they are the day of the pull, including state and national. State and national will require proof of age and proper sanctioning paper work from lower meets.
- 4. Each participant must register prior to the starting of their age group.
- 5. Rules of Conduct by Participants:
 - A. The child may not place their hand on the tractor tire at any time during their pull to help increase their pulling distance.
 - B. The child may not place one or both feet on the ground to push their tractor forward.
 - C. There can be no loss of forward pressure. In other words, they can not hesitate or absolutely never jerk the equipment.
 - D. The child will remain in the seat at all times. If a contestant lifts off the seat, the pull will be stopped and their distance will be measured to that point.
 - E. All participants must be wearing shoes, no bare feet. (We would suggest tie or Velcro shoes that cover the foot and give traction to the pedal.)
- 6. Any arguing with the track officials by a contestant, parent or guardian will not be allowed and could result in disqualification of the contestant. We will display sportsmanship in all cases, and should that not be possible, the offender will be asked to leave. No one is perfect, but we will handle things in the proper way.
- 7. All rulings by track officials are final and may supersede any of the above rules. In the case of need, a sled may be reweighted and the group may start over.
- 8. Sanctioning: In Ohio, the Sanctioned pull will qualify the top three (3) in each age division4-11.

Established Policies

THE FOLLOWING POLICIES HAVE BEEN ESTABLISHED AND AUTHORIZED BY THE BELMONT CO. AGRICULTURAL SOCIETY BOARD OF DIRECTORS FOR THE 2023 BELMONT CO. FAIR.

- ** 1. No person shall be permitted to make solicitations of any nature, post or display signs, distribute handbills or advertising material, or sell or distribute free any merchandise, except persons in contracted concession or commercial rented spaces.
- ** 2. Disorderly people will be removed from grounds and illegally parked vehicles will be towed from grounds at owner's expense. Vehicles are prohibited from parking around the livestock barns.
- ** 3, NO alcoholic beverages or drugs are permitted on the fairgrounds or in the camping areas. Violators will be removed from the fairgrounds immediately and will not be permitted to return to the fairgrounds the remainder of the 2023 fair. In addition, violators will not be permitted on the fairgrounds or in camping areas for the 2024 fair.
- ** 4. Concealed weapons are prohibited in buildings on the fairgrounds.
- ** 5. Hand held laser devices, build-up games, helium tanks or helium filled balloons are prohibited. Violators will be subject to possible dismissal from the fair-

- grounds at the discretion of the concession manager and/or the Belmont County Agricultural Society.
- ** 6. ALL DOGS OR PETS (EXCEPT HELPER DOGS IN USE BY THEIR OWNER AND DOGS BEING USED IN CONTRACTED PERFORMANCES) ARE PROHIBITED ON GROUNDS OR IN EXHIBITION BUILDINGS.
- ** 7. Official veterinarian approved by the Ohio Department of Agriculture Allie Cain, Large Animal Vet.
- **8: Vet must check all deceased or sick species before they leave the fairgrounds.
- ** 9. All bills must be presented by Nov. 1 or they will not be paid within the fiscal year. All checks not cashed within 60 days will be voided and payment refused.
- ** 10. The Belmont Co. Agricultural Society is not responsible for printing errors in the 2023 Belmont Co. Fair Handbook.
- **11. Lost and Found Dept. is located at the Secretary's Office, located next to the Carnes Center and Main Entrance.
- **12. No Refunds No Rain Dates.
- 13. No one non-ambulatory allowed in the arenas during shows and sales.
- 14. Not responsible for loss/damages to vehicles while parked in parking areas.



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
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ENTRIES

- 1. All exhibitors shall be required to have all open class entries in the hands of the Fair Secretary, Becky Selmon, P.O. Box 704 St. Clairsville, OH 43950 and fees paid by 5 pm, Sat., Aug. 12, 2023. Entries may be made by mailing your entries and fees (postmarked on or before Aug. 12, 2023) or in person at the Secretary's office on the fairgrounds from 4-8 p.m. on Fri., and 12-5 p.m. on Saturday Aug. 11 and 12. Late entries will be accepted at the discretion of the Secretary or Department Superintendent if space is available.
- **2.** All exhibitors must purchase a \$25 membership ticket (*if a resident of Belmont County and age 18 or over*) or a \$25 exhibitor ticket (*if not a resident of Belmont County and/or under age 18*). In addition, entry fees must be paid as listed in Department I, II and III.
- **3.** Entries once entered upon the books of the Secretary cannot be withdrawn for the purpose of entering the same in another section or class or in the same section or class.
 - 4. No refunds will be made on entries received.
- **5.** Members of the same family will not be permitted to compete for the same kind of article without paying an additional entry fee.
- **6.** Unless otherwise listed, no exhibit is to be entered in the name of any other than the bona fide owner.
- 7. None but the department superintendent(s) of the Belmont County Agricultural Society will be permitted to examine the books before premiums are awarded.
- **8.** In order to protest an entry in either Open Class or Junior Fair, the following guidelines and procedures must be followed. *(1)* The protest must be submitted in writing to the Department Superintendent within 24 hours of action being protested. *(2)* Before any further action is taken, a \$50 deposit must accompany the written protest. (3) Immediate action will be taken after review of the protest first by Junior Fair Board of Directors (if a Junior Fair entry), then by the Belmont County Agricultural Society's Board of Directors Executive Committee and then by the Belmont County Agricultural Society Board of Directors for a final decision on the matter. (4) If protester is correct, the \$50 deposit will be returned. If protester is ruled incorrect, the \$50 deposit becomes the property of the Belmont County Agricultural Society.

EXHIBITS AND JUDGING

- 1. Exhibitors shall receive a card or cards containing the number and class for entries made by the secretary. This card (s) is required before exhibits are placed on fairgrounds.
- **2.** All livestock must be in place on the fairgrounds by 7 pm., Tues., Sept. 5, 2023. No animals or tack can be put in place before 5 pm., Sun., Sept. 3, 2023.
- **3.** All Domestic Arts and Horticulture exhibits must be in place by date and time listed in the rules of each department and/or section of the fair handbook.
- **4.** All open-class animals may leave the grounds between 10 p.m. Saturday and 10 a.m. Sunday. All other animals that do not fall in the

- above categories or are still on the grounds as of 10 a.m. Sunday, must stay on the grounds until 3 p.m. on Sunday. All other exhibits, including commercial and concession displays, must remain in place until 5 p.m., Sun. Sept. 10.
- **5.** Any exhibitor in open class or junior fair will forfeit premiums and be barred from exhibition at the fair the following year if exhibit removal time is violated without approval from Josh Lude, Leroy Carpenter, Mark Stephens, or Ed Campbell.
- **6.** The Department Superintendents and Committees will take every precaution in their power for the preservation of all articles on exhibit after their arrival and arrangement on the grounds, but will not be responsible for loss or damage.
- **7.** When there is but one exhibitor of several animals or articles in the same class, first, second, or third premium will be awarded according to the merit of the exhibit.
- **8.** If animal or article is not deemed worthy of premium, the judge will not make the award.
 - **9.** The decision of the judge(s) is final.
- 10. It is the duty of the Superintendent of the various departments to assist the awarding committee in finding the articles on exhibition and see that none shall be overlooked.

ADDITIONAL RULES AND REGULATIONS FOR LIVESTOCK EXHIBITS

- **1.** No more than two entries per exhibitor in each of the single classes and no more than one entry per exhibitor in each of the group classes.
- 2. All exhibitors must give total head of livestock when making entries.
- **3.** The Department Superintendents reserve the right to take measures prior to assigning entries to pens or stalls during the fair that may be deemed necessary to protect the health of livestock shown at the fair.
 - **4.** Registration papers must be available upon request.
 - **5.** No bedding will be provided.
- **6.** Any animal entered for exhibition in one class cannot compete for a premium in any other way except as one of a pair or herd.
- **7.** No person other than the officers of the Society, judges, exhibitors of the stock and invited guests will be permitted to enter the ring where stock is being exhibited, and these will have places assigned them by the Department Superintendents.
- **8.** The standard authority in all cases of pedigrees of livestock shall be the recognized "record" of such class or breed. All animals must be registered when shown for pure blood if they are of the proper age for registration.
- **9.** The Belmont County Agricultural Society's Board of Directors reserves the right to test for drugs or disqualify any and all animals at their discretion at the 2023 Belmont County Fair.
- **10.** All stalls are to be cleaned by the exhibitor following the removal of the animals.
 - **11.** Any violation of these regulations will forfeit premiums.

- **12.** Entry fees are as follows: \$5.00 per class for all beef and dairy cattle and \$2.50 per class for all goats except for championship classes.
- **13.** Five (5) Single Day Passes will be issued to each livestock exhibitor who exhibits 5 or more animals.
- **14.** All Inspection and Health Requirements of Livestock Exhibited in Ohio apply.

INSPECTION & HEALTH REQUIREMENTS OF LIVESTOCK EXHIBITED IN OHIO. NOTE: A REVISED LIST OF INSPECTION & HEALTH REQUIREMENTS FOR 2023 IS AVAILABLE FROM THE FAIR SECRETARY UPON REQUEST.

901:1-18-01 Chapter's Application

- **(A)** Animals listed in this chapter when moved or imported into Ohio for exhibition purposes only shall comply with the requirements of this chapter and when in compliance with the provisions of this chapter shall, with the exception of rules governing movement and importation of quarantined animals, be exempt from any other rules governing movement within or importation into Ohio.
- **(B)** Animals moved within or imported into Ohio for any purpose in addition to exhibition shall meet all movement and import requirements of Chapter 901:1-17 of the Administrative Code.

901:1-18-02 Definitions.

As used in this chapter:

- **(A)** "Exhibition" means any public show of animals which is sponsored by or under the control of an Ohio county or independent agricultural society organized under chapter 1711. of the revised code; or the Ohio state fair; or which is assembled for a period which exceeds thirty-six hours or contains animals of origins other than Ohio.
- **(B)** "Certificate of veterinary inspection" means a form from the state of origin which has been issued and completed by a licensed and accredited veterinarian attesting to the health status and identification of an animal listed thereon.
- **(C)** "Approved veterinarian" means any licensed and accredited veterinarian approved by the Ohio department of agriculture, or an employee of the Ohio department of agriculture or the United States department of agriculture, animal plant health inspection service, veterinary services.
- **(D)** "Licensed and accredited veterinarian" means a person who is licensed by the state of Ohio to practice veterinary medicine and who is certified by the United States department of agriculture, animal plant health inspection service, veterinary services, to be an accredited veterinarian.
- **(E)** "Residue" means any poisonous or deleterious pesticide governed by 40 C.F.R. 180, any poisonous or deleterious substance governed by 21 C.F.R. 109.6, or any other substance governed by 21 C.F.R. 556.
- **(F)** "Contagious or infectious disease" means any disease, including any foreign animal disease, or vector, capable of transmission by any means from a carrier animal to a human or to another animal and includes dangerously contagious or infectious diseases.
- **(G)** "Tuberculosis accredited free herd" is one that has passed at least two consecutive annual negative official tests for tuberculosis in accordance with the "Uniform Methods and Rules Bovine Tuberculosis Eradication", and has no other evidence of bovine tuberculosis.

901:1-18-03 Exhibitions:

sanitation, inspection and records.

- **(A)** Each entity sponsoring an exhibition shall have in attendance an approved veterinarian for the duration of the exhibit.
 - **(B)** Each entity sponsoring an exhibition shall:
- (1) Immediately, prior to an exhibition and under the direction of the approved veterinarian, thoroughly clean and disinfect each building, pen, stall, ring or other enclosure in which animals are to be quartered for exhibition:
 - (2) Have the approved veterinarian:
- (a) Examine the certificate of veterinary inspection when required for an animal brought to the exhibition;
- **(b)** Inspect within a reasonable time of arrival each animal brought to the exhibit for symptoms of any infectious or contagious diseases;
- (c) Daily inspect each animal present at the exhibition for symptoms of infectious or contagious disease.
- (3) Maintain a record for one year from the date of the exhibition of each animal present at the exhibit. The record shall contain the name and address of the owner of each animal and the species and breed of the animal.
- (4) May order the immediate removal of any animal which in the opinion of the approved veterinarian places other animals at unacceptable risk of disease.
- **(C)** An exemption from the requirements of paragraph (B)**(1)** of this rule may be requested from the department and will be granted when, in the judgment of the department, cleaning and disinfection will serve no purpose. By way of example only, cleaning and disinfection will generally serve no purpose in a newly constructed building that has never been occupied.

901:1-18-04 Exhibitors.

- **(A)** No person shall present for exhibition or exhibit an animal which he knows or has reason to suspect is affected with or has been exposed to a dangerously contagious or infectious disease or residue.
- **(B)** The owner or bailee of an animal with symptoms of an infectious or contagious disease shall, when directed by an exhibition official, the approved veterinarian, or an employee of the Ohio department of agriculture, immediately remove the animal from the exhibition premises.
- **(C)** Upon request, each person who presents for exhibition or exhibits an animal, shall make available any certificate of veterinary inspection, registration certificates, vaccination certificate, and other documents to exhibition officials, the approved veterinarian or an employee of the Ohio department of agriculture.
- **(D)** Each person who presents for exhibition or exhibits an animal for which a certificate of veterinary inspection is required by rules 901:1-18-01 to 901:1-18-11 of the Administrative Code shall forward a copy of the certificate of veterinary inspection to the Ohio department of agriculture's division of animal industry.

901:1-18-05 Poultry and fowl.

- (A) All turkeys, chickens and gamebirds moved within or imported into Ohio for exhibition must:
- (1) Originate directly from a flock or hatchery which is a participant in the national poultry improvement plan for the eradication of disease and be accompanied by documentary evidence that they meet the re-

quirements of this paragraph; or

- **(2)** Originate directly from a flock which has had a negative test for pullorum/fowl typhoid disease within twelve months preceding the opening date of exhibition and be accompanied by documentary evidence that they meet the requirement of this paragraph; or
- **(3)** Have had a negative test for pullorum/fowl typhoid disease, within ninety days, preceding the opening date of the exhibition and be accompanied by documentary evidence that they meet the requirement of this paragraph; or
- **(4)** Be tested for pullorum/fowl typhoid disease upon arrival at the exhibition by a tester approved by the Ohio department of agriculture and found negative.
- **(B)** The rapid whole blood test shall not be used to test turkeys for compliance with the requirements of paragraph (A)(2),(A)(3) and (A)(4) of this rule.
 - (C) Waterfowl, doves and pigeons are exempt from this rule.


901:1-18-06 Cattle.

- (A) Cattle moved within Ohio for exhibition:
- (1) The animals presented for exhibition must show no symptoms or evidence of an infectious or contagious disease.
 - (B) All cattle imported into Ohio for exhibition must:
- (1) Be accompanied by a certificate of veterinary inspection issued within thirty days preceding the opening date of the exhibition and be identified with official individual identification:
- **(2)** Originate from a tuberculosis-accredited free herd, an accredited free state or zone, or a modified accredited advanced state or zone;

- (3) If originate from a modified accredited state or zone must comply with Rule 901:1-17-03 of the Administrative Code;
- **(4)** If originate from an accreditation preparatory or a non-accredited state or zone are prohibited from exhibition;
- **(5)** If from a brucellosis class A state or area/zone must be negative to an official brucellosis test within thirty days of the opening date of the exhibition unless: they are under six months of age, steers, or official vaccinates under twenty months of age (dairy) or twenty-four months of age (beef); and
- **(6)** If from a brucellosis class B or C state or area/zone must meet all requirements for pre- entry testing as specified in 9 C.F.R. 78.9 and obtain an Ohio permit prior to movement.
- **(C)** Cattle from a brucellosis certified free herd or class free state or area/zone are not required to be brucellosis tested.

901:1-18-07 Goats.

- **(A)** Goats moved within Ohio for exhibition:
- (1) The animal presented for exhibition must show no symptoms or evidence of an infectious or contagious disease.
- **(2)** All sexually intact animals and any wether eighteen months of age and older must be identified with an official identification as defined in rule 901:1-13-04 of the Ohio Administrative Code.
 - **(B)** Goats imported into Ohio for exhibition:
- (1) Must be accompanied by a certificate of veterinary inspection issued within thirty days preceding the opening date of the exhibition and be identified with official individual identification;
 - (2) The animal presented for exhibition must show no symptoms or





evidence of an infectious or contagious disease; and

- (3) The owner and the veterinarian must attest to the following statement written on the certificate of veterinary inspection "the goats in this shipment are not known to be under any movement restrictions because of scrapie."
- (4) Originate from a tuberculosis accredited free herd as defined in rule 901-18-02 (G) of the Administrative Code for bovine tuberculosis eradication: or
- (5) Originate from a bovine accredited free state or zone, or a bovine modified accredited advanced state or zone; or
- (6) Originate from a bovine modified accredited state or zone must comply with Rule 901:1-17-06 of the Administrative Code.
- **(C)** If originate from a bovine accreditation preparatory or a bovine non-accredited state or zone are prohibited from exhibition.

901:1-18-08 Horses, mules and ponies.

- (A) Horses, mules and ponies moved within Ohio for exhibition:
- (1) If not under quarantine and if they are free of any signs of a contagious or infectious disease; and
- (2) If the animal is twelve months of age or older, the exhibition manager may require that the animal has been tested and classed negative to an official test for equine infectious anemia within twelve months of the opening date of the exhibition.
 - **(B)** Horses, mules and ponies imported into Ohio for exhibition:
- (1) Shall be accompanied by an official certificate of veterinary inspection issued within 30 days of the opening date of the exhibition; and

- (2) If the animal is twelve months of age or older, it shall be accompanied by evidence the animal was negative to an official test for equine infectious anemia within twelve months of the opening date of the exhibition; and
- (3) Upon request by an authorized representative of the Ohio department of agriculture, the person responsible for each animal must make available a chronological list of dates, places and events attended by this animal within thirty days prior to entry into Ohio.

901:1-18-09 Sheep.

- **(A)** Sheep moved within Ohio for exhibition:
- (1) The animal presented for exhibition must show no symptoms or evidence of an infectious or contagious disease.
- (2) All sexually intact animals and any wether eighteen months of age and older must be identified with an official identification as defined in rule 901:1-13-04 of the Ohio Administrative Code.
 - **(B)** Sheep imported into Ohio for exhibition:
- (1) Must be accompanied by a certificate of veterinary inspection issued within thirty days preceding the opening date of the exhibition and be identified with official individual identification; and
- (2) The animal presented for exhibition must show no symptoms or evidence of an infectious or contagious disease; and
- (3) The owner and the veterinarian must attest to the following statement written on the certificate of veterinary inspection "the sheep in this shipment are not known to be under any movement restrictions because of scrapie."



& Operated

901:1-18-10 Swine.

- **(A)** Swine moved within Ohio for exhibition:
- (1) The animals presented for exhibition must show no symptoms or evidence of an infectious or contagious disease.
- (2) Will be exempt from the requirement of a certificate of veterinary inspection if they originate immediately and directly from a pseudorabies stage V area.
 - (3) Swine originating from a pseudorabies stage IV area shall:
- **(a)** Be accompanied by a certificate of veterinary inspection issued within thirty days preceding the opening date of the exhibition; and
 - **(b)** Originate from a pseudorabies qualified herd; or
- **(c)** Be negative to an official pseudorabies test within thirty days of the exhibition.
 - **(B)** Swine imported into Ohio for exhibition:
- (1) Must be accompanied by a certificate of veterinary inspection issued within thirtydays preceding the opening date of the exhibition; and
- **(a)** Originate immediately and directly from a pseudorabies stage V area or an area or country recognized by the United States department of agriculture, animal plant health inspection service, veterinary services as pseudorabies free; or
- **(b)** Originate immediately and directly from a pseudorabies stage IV area: and
- **(c)** Be negative to an official pseudorabies test within 30 days of the exhibition.

901:1-18-11 Llama.

- **(A)** Camelids including, but not limited to, llamas, alpacas and vicuanas moved within Ohio for exhibition when presented for exhibition must show no symptoms or evidence of an infectious or contagious disease.
- **(B)** Camelids including, but not limited to, llamas, alpacas and vicuanas imported into Ohio for exhibition:
- **(1)** Must be accompanied by a certificate of veterinary inspection issued within thirty days preceding the opening date of the exhibition and be identified with official individual identification.
- **(2)** When presented for exhibition must show no symptoms or evidence of contagious disease.

SHEEP AND GOAT, EXHIBITION REQUIREMENTS

From The Ohio Department of Agriculture 2-21-02

In order for Ohio to maintain Consistent State Status, Ohio sheep and goat exhibitions will be considered Interstate Commerce.

- **A.** Requirements for bringing sheep and goats into Ohio for exhibition, sale or breeding
- **1.** Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) issued within 30 days of the opening date of the exhibition.
- **2.** CVI must be signed by the owner and the veterinarian attesting to the following statement: "the sheep/goats in this shipment are not known to be under any movement restrictions because of "scrapie."
 - 3. Show no evidence of infectious or contagious disease.
- **4.** All sheep and goats must be identified with official USDA identification (USDA approved sheep tags, USDA approved tattoos, or identifica-



tion in the Scrapie Flock Certification Program)

- **5.** If the animal was born after Jan. 1, 2002, it must have official USDA sheep/goat identification and be identified to the flock of birth.
- **A.** Identification requirements for sexually intact sheep and goats moving within Ohio for exhibition including sales
- 1. Official USDA sheep/goat identification in the form or an approved tag or tattoo
- **2.** If the animal was born after January 1, 2002, it must have official USDA sheep/goat identification and be identified to the flock of birth by an eartag or tattoo placed by the owner of the flock of birth, or a tag or tattoo placed by the purchaser.
- **3.** The identification requirements for flocks enrolled in the Voluntary Scrapie Flock Certification Program qualify as official USDA identification for exhibition and interstate movement; no other special identification is needed.

Ohio sheep and goat wethers that are less than 18 months of age exhibited in Ohio do not require USDA identification.

- **B.** "Exhibition" means any public show of animals which is sponsored by or under the control of an Ohio county or independent agricultural society OR the Ohio State Fair OR which is assembled for a period which exceeds 36 hours OR contains animals of origins other than Ohio. Includes show lamb and goat sales, consignment sales of livestock and jackpot shows
- **D.** Responsibilities of an exhibition sponsor (includes show lamb and goat sales, consignment sales of livestock and jackpot shows):
 - **1.** Must have an approved veterinarian
 - 2. Buildings, pens, stalls, rings and other enclosures in which ani-

mals are to be quartered for exhibition must be cleaned and disinfected prior to the exhibition under the direction of the approved veterinarian.

- **3.** The approved veterinarian is required to:
- a. Examine CVI when required; and
- **b.** Inspect livestock for infectious or contagious diseases within a reasonable time of arrival; and
 - **c.** Inspect livestock daily.
- **4.** May order the immediate removal of any animal which, in the opinion of the approved veterinarian, places other animals at unacceptable risk of disease.
- **5.** Maintain a record for one year from the date of the exhibition of each animal present at the exhibit. Sheep and goat sale records must be kept for 5 years. (see (F) on the next page)
- **E.** For livestock purchased at an exhibition and moved out of state, an accredited veterinarian must issue a certificate of veterinary inspection before the animal moves across the state line.
- **F.** The Code of Federal Regulations requires that sheep and goat sale records be kept for 5 years by the seller, the buyer and the exhibition/sale sponsor. The records must contain the following information:
- 1. Name and address of the seller, telephone number if available; and
- 2. Name and address of the buyer, telephone number if available; and
- ${\bf 3.}$ Official identification when required as indicated in Part A and B of these requirements; and
 - 4. Date of sale.



- 1. Camping cost is \$200 per camper for all week of. No parking of camper before Friday morning Sept. 1, 2023. Campers will be parked Friday, Saturday, Sunday or Monday from 8am to dark.
- 2. Space prices DO NOT include fair entry. Everyone staying in the camper must have and hold a ticket for the week of the fair. Tickets must be membership, season or exibitor tickets, or junior fair member or advisor wristbands. Before any camper is parked the occupants must have a camping permit and contact a fair board director. Tickets must be purchased before the camper permit is issued. Camper permits must be visible from the outside.
 - 3 All fire lanes must be kept open at all times.
 - 4. Quiet hours begin at 12 midnight. Please consider your neighbors.
 - 5. All trash is to be placed in the proper containers. No sewer or gray water is permitted to be discharged on the ground.
 - **6.** No Outside refrigeration units.
 - 7. Electric cords used on campers must be #12 wire for 50 feet or less #10 wire for anything over 50 feet.
- 8. The above rules will be enforced by the Belmont Co. Agricultural Society. The Society reserves the right to cancel, reject or refuse any persons or campers, and will not be held responsible for accidents of any sort.

Still project trophies will be released to club advisors to put in club booths with still projects during booth set-up times, provided a completed "Thank You" has been turned in at the Junior Fair Board Office. Still project trophies released for club booths must remain in club booths until booths are released at 3:00 p.m. on Sunday. Still project trophies not released for club booths by the end of booth set-up on Tuesday will remain in the trophy case in the Livestock Show Arena. Still project trophies remaining in the trophy case all week will be released after 9:00 a.m. on Saturday provided a completed "Thank You" has been turned in at the Junior Fair Board Office. "Thank You" notes must be written and turned in to the Junior Fair Board Office before a trophy will be released. All trophies must be picked up from the Livestock Show Arena trophy case by 6:30 p.m. on Sunday. "Thank You" notes not written for trophies at the fair may be turned in to the Extension office after the fair, at which time the trophy will be released to the recipient. Outstanding Project Knowledge (OPK) award "Thank You" notes will be given to organizational advisors with the OPK award. Organizational advisors are responsible for making sure youth complete their "Thank You" and submit it to the Junior Fair Office by 9:00 a.m. on Saturday.

- **2.** ALL Junior Fair premiums will be paid to club advisors after the close of the 2023 fair.
- **3.** In order to protest an entry in either Open Class or Junior Fair, the following guidelines and procedures must be followed.
- (1) The protest must be submitted in writing to the Department Superintendent within 24 hours of action being protested.
- (2) Before any further action is taken, a \$50 deposit must accompany the written protest.
- (3) Immediate action will be taken after review of the protest first by Junior Fair Board of Directors (if a Junior Fair entry), then by the Belmont County Agricultural Society's Board of Directors Executive Committee and then by the Belmont County Agricultural Society Board of Directors for a final decision on the matter.
- (4) If protestor is correct, the \$50 deposit will be returned. If protestor is ruled incorrect, the \$50 deposit becomes the property of the Belmont County Agricultural Society.

ALL 4-H AND FFA MEMBERS TAKING ANY MARKET, LACTATING, OR EGG PRODUCTION PROJECTS ARE REQURIED TO PARTICIPATE IN LIVESTOCK QUALITY ASSURANCE. MEMBERS ARE NOTIFIED OF THESE SCHEDULES.

Violations to rules in this book are subject to review by Junior and Senior Fair Board to determine eligibility in current and upcoming fair. Any misconduct or action of individuals on the fairgrounds that would be deemed unsafe or not listed/addressed in this fair tab, are subject to review by the Junior and Senior Fair Board following the procedure of 1st offense – verbal warning, 2nd offense – written warning, and 3rd offense – sent home for reminder of current fair. Eligibility for current, upcoming, and future fairs will be discussed by both boards after removal from grounds. Belmont County Sheriff's Department will assist in any matter that is deemed necessary by Junior Fair Coordinator(s) and/or Senior Fair Board. Dismissal from participating in current fair and removal from grounds may come before written warnings when deemed necessary by both Junior Fair Board and Senior Fair Board (Belmont County Sheriff's office used as needed).

All Junior Fair Livestock must be in the possession of the exhibitor by each department's deadline date. All market animals must be born on , or after Jan. 1, 2023, with the exception of market steers for the 2023 fair. The animal's housing location must be declared on each of the respective registration forms. Animals must be under the care of the member and can only be housed on the family's or guardians property. "Family" means the immediate family of an exhibitor, including but not limited to the exhibitor's parent, step-parent, foster parent, grandparent, step grandparent, foster grandparent, brother, sister, step-brother, step-sister, half-brother, half-sister, son, daughter, step-son, stepdaughter, or guardian. If a member is unable to keep their project animal on their property and do not have a "family" member that can keep their project animal, the member must complete a Housing Exception Form to be filled out and returned with the registration form. Each form will be considered by the Junior Fair Livestock Committee for approval. After each department's registration deadline date, random spot checks will be made by Senior Fair Board members and Junior Fair Livestock Committee members to assure that animals are tagged properly. Anyone knowingly switching or replacing animals after the possession date will be disqualified from showing or selling at the Belmont County Junior Fair during the current year. These random spot checks may occur until time of fair.

ALL MARKET LIVESTOCK AND LACTATING DAIRY CATTLE AND DAIRY GOATS ANI-MAL EXHIBITORS MUST ATTEND A QUALITY ASSURANCE TRAINING SESSION TO BE ELIGIBLE TO EXHIBIT AND SELL AT THE BELMONT COUNTY FAIR. ALL BELMONT COUNTY YOUTH MUST HAVE LIVESTOCK QUALITY ASSURANCE CERTIFICATION BY JULY 1, 2023. ALL YOUTH EXHIBITING A MARKET OR LACTATING DAIRY CATTLE AND DAIRY GOAT ANIMAL MUST COMPLETE A DRUG USE NOTIFICATION FORM IN ORDER TO EXHIBIT AND SELL AT THE BELMONT COUNTY FAIR. THESE FORMS ARE TO BE TURNED IN AT THE WEIGH-INS ON TUESDAY OF THE FAIR.

The Belmont County Agricultural Society's Board of Directors reserves the right to test for drugs or disqualify any and all animals at their discretion at the 2023 Belmont County Fair.

TELLING WHAT YOU HAVE DONE AND LEARNED THROUGH YOUR PROJECT TO LIVESTOCK SKILLATHON.

Grooming

All clipping, grooming, and shearing must be done prior to animals arrival at the fairgrounds. No artificial color, adhesive, enhancers, etc. may be used in preparing market animals for the fair. Market animals should be washed and brushed only. NO Sleeves, Blankets, Ice packs Ice, Wet towels and Drenching is permitted. If anyone is found guilty of this offense, he/she will be penalized by being ineligible to show (including showmanship) and sell that species of animal the present year and will be ineligible to bring any animal to the fair the following year. 4-H/FFA members preparing for Breeding Classes will not be restricted from grooming or clipping their animals. It is required that the member be present and actively participating in preparing project animal(s) they are going to show. For clarification, see specifics rules that pertain to your species.

Per Fair weigh-in tag in – Youth may register up to 4 animals during pre-fair Weigh in tag in – youth may weigh, tag in 1 additional animal as a Family Animal, to be used by any family member Fair weigh-In EID (electronic identification) Tag are to remain on animal. Youth is responsible for removal of all tags except EID, Federal tags and fair tags. If an animal is weighed and it does not make weight:

*Animal is taken off scale. * Zero scale. *No feed or water can be given to the animal. *Animal must not leave area (DOES NOT go back to barn or trailer) *Animal can then be weighed again-ONE TIME ONLY. Animals not making weight will be disqualified from showing in any market classes. All underweight animals may have the option to stay at the fair. If they stay at the fair, they must be shown in the showmanship classes, but they may not sell at the Junior Fair Livestock Sale, and must remain on the fairgrounds until specified release times (see Rule #5).

FOR 4-H & FFA MEMBERS

- 1. All Junior Fair livestock may also be entered in their respective open classes, if applicable. Open class entry form, must be sent to Becky Selmon, P.O. Box 704, St. Clairsville, OH 43950 Secretary of the Senior Fair Board. Regular entry fees will be charged.
- 2. All Junior Fair livestock must be registered at Livestock Skillathon. The registrations forms are DUE the day of Junior Fair Livestock Judging. Make-up judging is on August 15, 2023, and forms must be turned in that day NO later than 4:30 p.m., August 15, 2023. All forms are available from the Belmont County Extension Office.
- 3. Regularly enrolled members of Belmont Co. 4-H clubs, organized and conducted under the supervision of the Ohio State University Extension and Belmont Co. FFA members are eligible to exhibit in this department. A member must not have passed his/her 19th birthday on January 1, of the current year to be eligible. If individual livestock entries are submitted by the end of the fair entry grace period, members will not lose individual livestock premiums.

4. All Junior Fair Market Animals, excluding rabbits and poultry, must be in place by Mon., Sept. 4, 2023 by 4pm.

5. ALL LIVESTOCK GOING THROUGH THE JR. FAIR LIVESTOCK SALE MUST LET THE JR. FAIR OFFICE KNOW OF THEIR ANIMALS BEING SOLD BY THE CONCLUSION OF THE SWINE SHOW. ANI-MALS WILL NOT GO THROUGH SALE IF PARTICIPANT DOES NOT LET THE JR. FAIR OFFICE KNOW BY THE COMPLETION OF THE BEEF SHOW. All animals sold at the auction that are going to be hauled by the livestock sale committee are released at 7pm on Friday. Other livestock sold at the auction and being hauled privately may leave the grounds 9pm Friday to 10am Saturday after letting Ed Campbell, Mark Stephens, Josh Lude, or Leroy Carpenter know of the removal. Any animals not removed from the grounds during that timeframe, must follow other animal release times which are as follows: All livestock that are under or overweight requirements MUST leave the grounds immediately following weigh-in unless participating in showmanship. After participating in showmanship, all underweight and overweight animals MUST LEAVE THE FAIRGROUNDS after their species show is complete between 10pm and 8am the following morning. Any market HOGS not going through the livestock sale and still on the grounds after 2am on Wednesday, must stay in place until Sunday at 3pm. Market hogs that are not being sold in the auction can leave between 10pm and 2am on Tuesday

following the hog show, if market hogs do not leave between these times, they must stay in place until Sunday at 3pm. All open-class animals may leave the grounds between 10pm Saturday and 10am Sunday. All other animals that do not fall in the above categories or still on the grounds as of 10am Sunday, must stay on the grounds until 3pm on Sunday. Any violation of the above, will result in the individual forfeiting of his/her project premiums and exclusion in exhibiting in the Junior Fair the following year. Exhibitors are responsible for hauling animals sold at the auction but were donated back to them, except for Grand and Reserve Grand market steers, market goats, market lambs, and market hogs. Conflicts about release times will be reviewed and ruled on by the Senior Fair Board Livestock Superintendent and/or Assistant Superintendent.

6. All animals must be shown by owner unless WRITTEN permission is given by the Jr. Fair Coordinators, for another Belmont Co. Junior Fair member to show animal. Except in the case where a member has 2 or more animals in the same class, then another Belmont Co. Junior Fair member may show the second animal without written permission.

7. NO assistance from adults, except in emergency. This also applies to show-manship classes. Each exhibitor is encouraged to fit their own animal.

8. Animals to be replaced (sick or die):

a. Advisors must submit a signed statement of proof of loss.

b. Advisors must give approval before animal can be replaced.

c. No replacement will be given after the following dates:

* June 1 – Steers * July 15 – Lambs, Goats, and Hogs. * August 1 – Rabbits and Poultry

*August 27 - Horses (must be replaced by registered replacement horse)

d. Veterinarian's statement must be given in case of sickness or death of an animal for replacement.

e. Animals can be purchased or replaced by another animal that has previously been weighed in, tagged, or registered and owned by a sibling or previously weighed-in, tagged, or registereed as a family share animal ONLY AS A RESULT OF DEATH OF AN ANIMALBEFORE REPLACEMENT DATES.

9. No animals or tack can be put in barns before Sun., Sept. 3, at 5 p.m. There is no restriction on when tack can be taken from the barn, but no vehicles can be driven up to the barn between 10 a.m. and 5 p.m. on any day. Failure to comply with rule #9 will result in loss of premiums (BEDDING APPLIES TO THIS RULE).

10. Junior Fair stall assignments are assigned by Junior Fair adult department advisor. Failure to house your animal(s) in assigned space, will result in forfeit of premiums. NO stalls are to be switched unless approved and done by 4-H educator and barn superintendent.

11. MARKET ANIMALS ARE TO REMAIN IN THE CARE OF THE EXHIBITOR UNTIL IT IS REMOVED FROM THE FAIRGROUNDS. ALL PREMIUMS WILL BE FORFEITED FOR FAILURE TO FEED AND WATER ANIMAL DAILY AND CLEAN STALL. IN EXTREME CASES, EXHIBITOR MAY BE BANNED FROM EXHIBITING THE FOLLOWING YEAR AT THE BELMONT COUNTY FAIR.

13. All Junior Fair livestock exhibitors are to clean stalls/pens to the ground before leaving the fairgrounds.

Exhibitors must have their stall checked by a Junior Fair Board Director or Advisor, from their barn, before leaving. Failure to clean stalls/pens will result in

forfeiture of Junior Fair livestock premiums.

12. All animals taken to the fair must be entered in a class.

13. All first place winners in all livestock classes, except horses, are to compete for Champion or Grand Champion. Remaining first place winners plus second place winner of class producing a Champion are to compete for Reserve Champion or Reserve Grand Champion.

14. All Grand Champion and Reserve Grand Champion market hogs, market steers and market lambs and market goats must go directly to a state inspected slaughter house or to the sale barn and then directly to a state inspected slaughter house

15. Premium money will be paid to all Junior Fair Livestock exhibitors for projects COMPLETED AND EXHIBITED. If a member has more than one animal in a project area, only one premium will be awarded except for breeding projects.

16. All Junior Fair Beef and Dairy Cattle must be secured with a neck rope. Failure to comply with this rule will mean the animal must be removed immediately from the fairgrounds.

17. If more than 10 entries in Showmanship Classes, the class may be divided.
18. It is recommended that all Junior Fair exhibitors be dressed in appropriate attire and be neat and clean in appearance. No advertisement of any kind will be allowed in the show ring.

19. NO STRAW WILL BE FURNISHED FOR THE FAIR – YOU MUST FURNISH YOUR OWN BEDDING.

20. The first-place winners from Junior, Intermediate, and Senior showmanship classes of the current year will compete for the Master Showman. The winner of the Master Showman is selected, the showman who placed 2nd to that showman will enter the ring. This process will continue until the Top 5 Showmen of the species have been selected. Only showmen who placed 1st, 2nd, or 3rd within their respective age divisions from Junior, Intermediate, and Senior showman-ship categories will be eligible to participate in the Top 5 Showmen selection. This is the order of showmen that will be used to determine eligibility for the Showman of Showmen contest.

21. Members can show another person's animal in showmanship classes with the consent of the owner if there are unforeseen circumstances such as sickness of animal resulting in the animal being sent home, etc., and fair entry forms have been submitted to the Extension Office by the entry form deadline date. (*This rule does not pertain to horses*).

22. Once an exhibitor enters a class with an animal for showmanship, he/she may not switch animals for the class.

23. Only livestock entered in a bonafide market class will be eligible for sale.

24. In case of an emergency (*flat-tire, accident, etc.*) on your way to fair weighin, call the Senior Fair Board Office at 695-5059 or 740-391-8218 to advise the Senior Fair Board Livestock Superintendent of your situation and let them know you will be late for weigh-in. Situations will be reviewed by the Senior Fair Board Livestock Superintendent and Assistant Superintendent for approval. **25.** All exhibitors must have all livestock removed and stalls cleaned by 6:30 p.m. on Sunday or fair premiums will be forfeited.

1. All feeder calves must: weigh 300-750 pounds at weigh-in on Monday, September 4, 2023 and should be born between January 1 and May 1, 2023. Feeder calves may not be purchased and re-exhibited from another fair during the current year. All feeder calves must be registered on Jr. Fair Livestock Forms that will be due in the OSU Extension office by June 15, 2023.

Late registrations are not permitted and will prevent Jr. Fair members from exhibiting and selling at the Belmont County Fair. Feeder Calves must be registered by June 15, and owned and in the continual care of the member by July 1, 2023. These registered feeder calves must be ear tagged with tags provided by the Belmont County Junior Fair by July 1, 2023. After July 1, random spot checks will be made by Senior Fair Board members and Junior Fair Livestock Committee members to assure that animals are tagged properly. Anyone knowingly switching or replacing animals after the possession date will be disqualified from showing or selling at the Belmont County Junior Fair during the current year. These random spot checks may occur until time of fair. There will be no replacement date for feeder calves.

All feeder calf projects are required to send a picture of the calf that has been ear tagged and has animal and exhibitor pictured together to the extension office BY JULY 1, 2023.

- 2. Crossbred dairy feeder calves WILL BE shown with beef feeder calves. Any amount of beef in dairy feeder calf will be considered a beef feeder.
- **3.** Junior Fair Members may register up to four feeder calves. Two feeder calves is the maximum for each exhibitor to show.

- **3.** Participants must be able to provide original registration papers during the fair. The Junior Fair member's records must include the animal's official Scrapie ID and the name and address of the flock where the animal was born and where and when it was sold (USDA).
- 4. Harness Goats may be shown horned or dehorned.
- **5.** Harness Goats must be either wethers or does.
- **6.** Harness Goats are only permitted to enter in Harness Goat classes.
- 7. Only one Harness Goat may be entered per exhibitor per class.
- 8. READ DEPARTMENT 7 GENERAL LIVESTOCK RULES.





All clipping, grooming, and shearing must be done prior to animals arrival at the fairgrounds. No artificial color, adhesive, enhancers, etc. may be used in preparing market animals for the fairfor the fair. Market animals should be washed and brused only. If anyone is found guilty of this offense, he/she will be penalized by being ineligible to show (including showmanship) and sell that species of animal the present year and will be ineligible to bring any animal to the fair the following year. 4-H/FFA members preparing for Breeding Classes will not be restricted from grooming or clipping their animals. It is required that the members be present and actively participating in preparing project animal(s) they are going to show.

SWINE SHOWMANSHIP

All exhibitors should compete in showmanship classes according to their age as of January 1 of the current year.

MARKET HOG RULES

- 1. All market hog projects must be registered on Junior Fair Livestock Forms that will be due in the OSU Extension office by June 1, 2023. Late registrations are not permitted and will prevent Jr. Fair members from exhibiting and selling at the Belmont Co. Fair. Market Hogs must be registered by June 1, and owned and in the continual care of the member by June 15, 2023. These registered market hogs must be ear tagged with tags provided by the Belmont Co. Junior Fair by June 15, 2023. After June 15, random spot checks will be made by Senior Fair Board members and Junior Fair Livestock Committee members to assure that animals are tagged properly. Anyone knowingly switching or replacing animals after the possession date will be disqualified from showing or selling at the Belmont Co. Junior Fair during the current year. These random spot checks may occur until time of fair.

DIVISION 706 - LIVESTOCK SALE

BELMONT COUNTY JUNIOR FAIR LIVESTOCK SALE COMMITTEE CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS

CONSTITUTION

Article I

The name of the organization shall be called "Belmont County Junior Fair Livestock Sale Committee".

Article II

The major purpose of the committee is to work with the Extension Educators and representatives of other youth organizations in helping to determine need and direction of the Junior Fair Livestock Sale by: 1. Assisting with planning, evaluating, recommending and carrying out activities as they relate to the Junior Fair Sale.

2. Seeking local financial resources and support, as needed, to conduct, promote and expand the Junior Fair Sale.

Article III

Officers of the committee shall be president, vice president, secretary and treasurer. The committee will meet in, March, June, August and October.

BY-LAWS

Article I

Two advisors and two members will represent each club participating in market livestock projects and will be elected by their club.

Article II

The officers of the committee shall be elected at the March meeting each year and shall be called the "Executive Committee".

Article III

The duties of the officers shall be: The PRESIDENT shall preside at all meetings of the committee and always have in mind the best interest of the committee; the VICE PRESIDENT shall perform the duties of the president in his absence: the SECRETARY shall keep a record of all proceedings of the committee and shall act as correspondent in matters pertaining to the business of the committee and the TREASURER shall receive and take care of all monies belonging to the committee and shall pay out upon order of the president and secretary and shall keep an accurate record of all receipts and expenditures.

Article IV

Committees for special purposes may be appointed by the President at any time.

Article V

The Executive Committee, under the advisement of the Extension Educators shall have decision making authority during the fair in regards to the Junior Fair Sale.

Article VI

Majority vote shall constitute an election.

Article VII

This constitution may be altered at any regular meeting of the Committee when due notice of such alteration or amendment shall have been given at a regular meeting preceding and passed by a two-thirds vote of the members present.

RULES

1. The Junior Fair Livestock Sale's Order of Sale will alternate annually with each species being sold in rotation within their time frame, 1:00 p.m. or 5 p.m. (With these exceptions: Feeder Calves; Beef Feeder Calves and Dairy Feeder Calves will alternate in sale order each year among themselves, which will always follow Steers; Turkeys, Broilers and Ducks will alternate in sale order each year among themselves. Any species goes to the bottom

of rotation after being at the top.

2. Junior Fair show rules must have been followed. All animals that will be sold at the Junior Fair Sale must be registered by the end of the Beef Show on Wednesday, September 6, 2023. This information must be given to the Junior Fair Office during the hours the office is open.

3. Grand Champion and Reserve Grand Champion Market Rabbit, Broilers, Ducks, Turkey, Hog, Goat, Steer, and Lamb animals must be sold in Junior Fair Livestock Sale. All Grand Champion and Reserve Grand Champion market hogs, market steers, market lambs and market goats must go directly to a state inspected slaughter house or to the sale barn and then directly to a state inspected slaughter house.

4. Junior Fair members may sell no more than two lots per person. The only exception is if an exhibitor has more than 2 Overall Grand or Reserve Grand Champion Animals.

5. No animal or lot allowed in sale ring more than once.

STEERS

1. Exhibitor may sell only one steer at Junior Fair Livestock Sale. Exhibitor will make decision on which animal to sell, if two animals were shown, immediately following the Steer Show. No changes may be made after giving Extension Staff your decision on which animal to sell. The only exception to this is if the exhibitor should have both the Overall Grand Champion and the Overall Reserve Grand Champion, then both sell.

2. Each market beef animal is to be sold individually.

LAMBS

Only Market Lambs weighing between 95-150 pounds may sell.

HOGS

Only Market Hogs between 220 – 300 pounds may sell.

FEEDER CALVES

Exhibitor may sell only one (1) feeder calf at the Junior Fair Livestock Sale. Exhibitor will make decision on which animal to sell; if two animals were shown. No changes may be made after giving the Junior Fair Office your decision on which animal to sell. Only feeder calves between 300-750 may sell

MARKET GOAT

Only Market Goats between 60-120 pounds may sell at the Junior Fair Livestock Sale.

BROILERS (Pen of Three)

Market Broiler Pen must consist of three chickens of the same breed type. Youth will show a pen of three birds and sell all three birds. Limit one pen entry per exhibitor. Grand Champion and Reserve Grand Champion pens must sell with other pens of Three Market Broilers. Buyers must make arrangements with youth on fair departure. Only market pens weighing between 24-32 pounds may sell.

RABBITS (Pen of Three Fryers)

Grand Champion and Reserve Grand Champion will sell and all other Pen of Three Market Fryers. Buyers must make arrangements with youth on fair departure. Only market pens between 9-15 pounds may sell.

TURKEYS

Grand Champion and Reserve Grand Champion will sell and all other turkeys. Buyers must make arrangements with youth on fair departure. Only Market Turkeys between 25-50 pounds may sell.

MARKET DUCKS (Pen of Two)

Grand Champion and Reserve Grand Champion will sell and all other pen of two market ducks. Buyers must make arrangements with youth on fair departure. Only market pens between 10-20 may sell.

RULES

*THE RULES WILL BE APPLIED DURING THE BELMONT COUNTY FAIR- FROM THE TIME OF ARRIVAL UNTIL DEPARTING THE FAIRGROUNDS.

- 1. READ DEPARTMENT 7 GENERAL LIVESTOCK RULES
- 2. ALL Junior Fair Horse Projects must be in place by 7pm, Tuesday, September 5, 2023
- **3.** The 4-H and FFA Horse Show will be judged using the State 4-H Uniform Rules for Horse Show. Any items not covered by the rules in Department 7 or Division 7 of this rule book will be guided by the Uniform Rules for Horse Show available by the OSU Extension Office.

(Copies can be obtained at the OSU Extension Office)

- 4. The 4-H and FFA Horse Show is open to those members exhibiting their project during the full length of the fair, unless there is inadequate barn space.
- **5.** It is MANDATORY to participate in 3 approved clinics or ride nights provided by the Jr Fair Advisors or the 4-H Horse Committee members with their project horse prior to the Jr Fair. The Horse Kick-Off Clinic only counts as 1 clinic/ride night.
- **6. Encouragement Sessions are mandatory** for the 1st and 2nd year exhibitors. They will meet with the Horse Jr Fair board Advisors at an agreeable time on either Monday or Tuesday before 7pm week of the Jr. Fair.
- 7. Encouragement Classes for the 1st and 2nd year exhibitors will be evaluated on project book knowledge. Each participating member will show a simple Showmanship pattern. The exhibitor and exhibiting horse's appearance, grooming, and general health of the animal will also be considered. Encouragement Class exhibitor's will be graded, but no placings given. A grade ribbon will be awarded at the time of show. Horses

will not be lined up head to tail for safety reasons.

- **8.** All exhibitors must register to the 4-H extension office their project horse(s) and back up horse by May 15 of the fair year. The back-up horse may not be replaced.
- Each horse participant may register maximum of two horses per division to the extension office by May 15th -- ONLY ONE HORSE PER DIVI-

SION MAY BE EXHIBITED AT THE JR COUNTY FAIR. With the exception of the Draft and Reproduction Division, who may register and participate at Jr Fair with a maximum of two horses in that division. Example Draft Team of two or Mare with current project year's foal. Should a decision need to be made concerning stabling of an extra project horse, the Sr Fair Livestock Committee and Jr Fair Horse Department Advisors will decide.

- 10. Equine Production Project must follow regulation outlined in the State 4-H production contract. Production Projects must list the name of the foal during Horse project registration that is due May 15th. Foals born after May 15th must list the name of Sire and Dam at the time of Horse project registration due May 15th.
- 11. Lease projects must follow regulations outlined in the State 4-H lease contract. Completed lease information is due to the OSU Extension Office by May 15th of the current year.
- 12. If a project horse becomes deceased, lame, injured, or sick, the project horse may be replaced by the registered back-up horse only and no later than August 25th of the fair year, which is approximately two weeks before Jr Fair. The exhibitor must provide a veterinary statement for verification to the OSU Extension Office, Sr Fair board Livestock Director, and a copy to the official Belmont County Fair Veterinarian (if verified by another vet) by August 25th of the fair year.
- 13. All Equine must be under restraint of its exhibitor or exhibitor's parent, guardian, or advisor always while outside of stall. No horse shall be loose unless contained. in its assigned stall. Refer to Department 7 General Livestock Rules.
- 14. Cell Phones or other distracting devices SHOULD NOT be in hand while handling the equine.
- 15. Paddock area is reserved for exhibitor, exhibitor's animal, guardian, fair directors and advisors.
- 16. All Equine Exhibitors are permitted to load up no earlier than 3pm on Sunday September 10th, 2023. Please refer to Department 7 General Livestock Rules for more details.

ARENA RULES

- **1. ELIGIBILITY** to ride during to Belmont County Fair on the fairgrounds.
- a. Must be enrolled in a 4-H/FFA Equine Project.
- **b.** Must be showing an Equine Project at the Fair.
- c. Member and Parent must have completed Equine Quality Assurance
- d. Must wear a properly fitted protective headgear which meets or exceeds. current ASTM/SEI standards with the chin harness securely fastened at all times while working, riding, or driving an equine. As written in the OSU STATE RULE BOOK #1 PROTECTIVE HEADGEAR
- **e.** OR with permission from the Belmont County Agricultural Society in signing a "Release of Liability" form by the exhibitor participating in a Sr Fair board approved Jr Fair equine activity.
- **2. SUPERVISION** All Jr Fair exhibitors regardless of age or skill level must have a parent, guardian, 4-H/FFA advisor, or Sr Fair Director supervising always. Individual clubs are encouraged to have supervision rules in place while riding and working their horse.
- **3. RIDING HOURS** are from 6am to 10:45 pm. **HORSES MUST BE IN THE BARN BY 11 P.M.** On show days it is permissible to start warm-up/exercising their horse at 5am.
- **a.** Ride time allotment sheets for sign-ups with be posted in the Horse Office during fair.
- **b.** Lights in the arena must be on after dusk.
- c. At the time in which the arena is being watered down due to dry weather, no exhibitors or animals will be permitted in the riding arena.
- **d.** No 4-H/FFA members are permitted to ride each other's horses.
- e. All horses must be ridden with a legal bridle, bosal, or hackamore.

All clipping, grooming, and shearing must be done prior to animals arrival at the fairgrounds. No artificial color, adhesive, enhancers, etc. may be used in preparing market animals for the fair. Market animals should be washed and brushed only. If anyone is found guilty of this offense, he/she will be penalized by being ineligible to show (including showmanship) and sell that species of animal the present year and will be ineligible to bring any animal to the fair the following year. 4-H/FFA members preparing for Breeding Classes will not be restricted from grooming or clipping their animals. It is required that the members be present and actively participating in preparing project animal(s) they are going to show.

POULTRY SHOWMANSHIP

All exhibitors should compete in showmanship classes according to their ages as of January 1 of the current year.

MARKET BROILER RULES

- 1. Market Broiler pen must consist of three chickens of the same breed type. Youth will show a pen of three birds and sell three birds. Limit one pen entry per exhibitor. Each exhibitor must provide NPIP hatch papers or have birds blood tested EACH YEAR. Blood Testing IS RE-QUIRED EACH YEAR.
- 2. All meat pens must be 6 weeks of age by fair.
- **3.** All exhibitors must purchase their broilers through private means. Broilers should be in the possession of the exhibitor by July 25 of the current year.
- **4.** All market poultry must receive a leg band after a successful weighin at fair. The leg bands will be provided by the Extension Office and placed on each bird by a Senior Fair Board Director at weigh-in during the fair.
- **5.** If one broiler in a pen becomes disqualified for any reason including weight, the whole pen becomes disqualified.
- **6.** Broilers in meat pens must be weighed individually on Tuesday, September 5, 2023 at 7:30 p.m.
- 7. Minimum weight of Market Broilers is 6 pounds per bird and the maximum weight is 8 pounds. Broilers in a pen should weigh as close to the same weight as possible. Any pen containing an underweight bird or overweight bird will have the option to stay at the fair and must be shown in showmanship classes but may not show in market class or sell at the livestock sale. If one or more market broilershall die or become ill/sent home after a successful weigh-in, the exhibitor will show and sell the remaining birds in the pen. If all three birds are sent home or die, the exhibitor will NOT show and sell the pen.

4-H Club work is a voluntary educational program available to all boys and girls between the ages of 5 and in kindergarten and 19. The program is supervised by the Ohio State University Extension, The Ohio State University, the United States Department of Agriculture and Belmont County Board of Commissioners cooperating. 4-H members 8-19 years of age "learn by doing" by enrolling in and completing a project in animal science, clothing, communications, computers, conservation, consumer education, engineering, entomology, field and garden crops, flower gardening, personal development and leadership, photography, collecting, family life, health, nutrition, earth sciences, wood sciences, and plant sciences, etc. Kindergarten - second grade youth participate in Cloverbud clubs which does not encourage competition and fosters learning through group activities.

4-H member participation in the Belmont County Fair is a privilege and opportunity to share accomplishments, interests and ideals. Projects must be made during the current registration year and must have been completed solely to meet requirements of a 4-H project. Armbands to cover the cost of daily admission to the fair are available to youth who exhibit a project or display an animal at the fair. The cost is \$5.00 per registered 4-H member and \$10.00 per approved adult volunteer provided all registration information and armband requests and fees are received by the Senior Fair Board Secretary by August 1, 2023 at 5:00 p.m. THERE WILL BE NO EXCEPTIONS. Armbands are to be requested for exhibitors and approved volunteers through only one Junior Fair organization.

Exhibits show results of complete projects. Most 4-H projects are evaluated at county 4-H Project Judging prior to the county fair. County fair exhibits are on a voluntary basis for member's completed projects.

There are more than 500 youth enrolled in the Belmont

County Community 4-H clubs. Local volunteers are credited for the leadership development among these young people.

Each club is under the direction of two or more local 4-H approved volunteers.

4-H CLUB BOOTH EXHIBITS

- 1. Each 4-H club booths will exhibit their projects in individual club booths. Club booths will be provided in the Jr Fair Building.
- 2. All entries are free. Booth Size Criteria points are assigned to projects, not members. 1 point for each livestock project and 3 points for each still project. Booth Committee members will assign booth sizes according to the point system. Advisors do not need to make booth requests.
- 3. Each club will select a theme consistent with the objectives, activities and accomplishments of 4-H. Decorations, project displays and educational messages should all incorporate or complement the overall theme.
- 4. Club exhibits must be completed and in place by 12:00 noon on Monday, September 4, 2023. The Jr Fair building will be open for setting up from 5:00 p.m. to 8:00 p.m. on Wednesday, August 30th and Thursday, August 31st; from 10:00 a.m. to 5 p.m. on Sunday, September 3rd and 10:00 a.m. to 12 noon on Monday, September 4, 2023. Exhibits must remain complete until 12 noon on Sunday, September 10, 2023. Booth tear-down will be from 12 noon to 3 p.m. on Sunday, September 10, 2023. All booths must be removed by 3:00 p.m., Sunday. No project may be removed before release times listed. Violation will result in forfeit of club booth premium and the individual forfeits his/her project premium and exclusion from exhibiting in the Junior Fair for the following year. 5. Booths are supplied by the Belmont County 4-H Council. White paper will be available for club use, however, any color or type of material may be used. All other supplies and equipment needed for completing the displays must be furnished by the individual clubs. Exhibits should not extend above the structure of the booth.
- 6. No paint is to be used on any part of the booth structure.
- 7. The use of electricity is strictly forbidden.
- 8. Do not hang paper or backdrops from the building ceiling.
- 9. No perishable foods can be used in display. Use models or pictures. Models may not have real icing.
- 10. DO NOT USE NAILS OR SCREWS OR GLUE IN BOOTHS. Use tape, thumb tacks or staples. These must be removed when the exhibits are taken down at the end of the fair. Clean up and remove all materials. Clubs must remove all paper, take out staples, thumb tacks, etc. All paper and trash should be deposited in cans outside doors and areas in front of booth swept. Junior Fair Department Advisors MUST CHECK YOUR BOOTH BEFORE YOU LEAVE. Booth premiums will be forfeited if clean-up is not done correctly. All booths must be checked and approved for premiums to be awarded.
- 11. If room permits, space will be provided for oversized projects that do not fit into individual club booth exhibits.
- 12. For the convenience of advisors who act as organization advisor to more than one club, the clubs may combine their displays in one booth.
- 13. Each club member's name must be attractively displayed within the exhibit other than on the Junior Fair cards. Advisors names may also be displayed.
- 14. Club name must be prominently displayed within the booth.
- 15. Any club that uses a copyrighted ideas, i.e. Garfield, Pepsi, etc. must have written permission from the company.

The message is, "Become your best, set your sites high. You can make it happen."

FAIR PROJECT RULES AND GUIDELINES

Girl Scouts

- 1. Girl Scouts consider participating in the Belmont County Fair a privilege and an opportunity to share interests, accomplishments and ideals. All entries must exhibit high quality in effort, originality and neatness. Entries should reflect, overall, the Girl Scout program and its ideals. Each girl's entry will be judged on its own merits and not against other entries. The age or program level of the Girl Scout and the degree of difficulty and skill will be noted.
- 2. Fair entries should be an outgrowth of a good Girl Scout program in a troop or camp, or showcasing the progress of each individual girl in pursuit of a hobby or interest. Projects must be made during the current

registration year to be entered and must not have been entered in any previous Belmont County Fair.

- 3. Judging ribbons will be awarded to each entry brought to judging according to degree of excellence: First Class Excellent; Second Class Well Done; Third Class Good. The criteria will be "Is this an average, good or excellent job of workmanship and creativity? Does it reflect the Girl Scout Program?, How much did the girl learn or grow in doing her project?". A Girl Scout's satisfaction will be in knowing she did her very best.
- 4. Every registered Girl Scout (Daisy through Ambassador) and every registered Girl Scout Troop in Belmont County is eligible to enter through pre-registration. Pre-registration deadline is July 31, 2023, for individual, group and troop registrations. Armbands to cover the cost of daily admission to the fair are available at a cost of \$5 per registered Girl Scout and \$10 per registered adult troop leader (limit 2 leaders per troop) for those exhibiting projects in the fair, provided all registration information and armband fees are received by the Girl Scout Advisor to the Junior Fair by July 31, 2023 and to the Senior Fair Board Secretary by August 1, 2023 by 5 p.m. THERE WILL BE NO EXCEPTIONS. Armbands are to be requested for exhibitors and adult advisors through only one Junior Fair organization.
- **5.** All entries, including booth entries, must be in place by 12 noon on Monday, Sept. 4, 2023, to be considered for a judging ribbon or booth award. All entries must be pre-registered prior to deadline (August 1, 2023). Items or booths displayed in Junior Fair brought after judging date and time will receive participation ribbons only.
- **6.** Each exhibitor is permitted to enter more than one project; however, only one judging ribbon will be awarded per exhibitor.
- 7. Group projects, entered in the fair by at least 3 girls working together in the same program level, will be considered and judged separately from individual projects, with a judging ribbon being awarded to the project and not to each individual working on that project. Scrapbooks or posters put together by adults are not eligible.
- **8.** All entries, including group projects, must have 3"X5" entry judging cards attached to qualify for judging. The cards must contain the following information: Name(s), Troop Number, Level, Age(s), Project Name, Leader Name. Without this card attached, the entry will not be judged. Cards will be distributed to troop leaders by the Girl Scout Advisor to the Junior Fair once registration information is received.
- 9. Exhibits are under the supervision of competent persons at all times and every effort will be made to protect them from loss or damage. However, neither the management of the Belmont Co. Fair nor Girl Scouts U.S.A., will be responsible for any loss or damage to exhibits.
- 10. Exhibits must not be removed before 12 p.m. on Sun., Sept. 10; any

troop or individual removing exhibits prior t that date and time will forfeit both premiums and ribbons awarded to the offending troop/individual and will be prohibited from exhibiting in Junior Fair the following year. Exhibit will be released only to the Girl Scout entering it or to her troop leader(s) as stated on the registration form. Exhibitors should be informed of this rule. THERE WILL BE NO EXCEPTIONS.

11. Special Instructions: ART ENTRIES - All painting, drawing, photographs, poetry, etc., must be of the original work of the girl submitting it. Murals that can be rolled will be exhibited only if space permits. All artwork, wall hangings and photography are to be matted or framed in some suitable form for exhibit, and ready to hang with wires, cords, etc., securely attached. COOK-**ING ENTRIES** - All exhibits must have recipes attached (ingredients and directions). Cakes and breads must be entered in whole and will be cut for judging. Cookies, candy or cupcakes must have at least 6 pieces submitted for judging. For displaying at the fair, items must have replica or picture of judged item on a paper plate with recipe attached. No perishable food can be used in display. SEWING OR WEARABLE CRAFT ENTRIES - All articles of wearing apparel, including jewelry or hair ornaments, must have a snapshot attached showing the article worn or modeled. **POSTER ENTRIES** - All poster exhibits may be no larger than 22"X 28".

GIRL SCOUT BOOTH DISPLAYS

- **1.** Each Service Unit in Belmont Co. may exhibit projects from Girl Scouts within their unit in a Service Unit booth in the Jr. Fair Building.
- 2. Booth space for the Belmont Co. Fair is being held for Service Units by the Girl Scout Advisor to the Jr. Fair Board and must be requested to the Ohio State University Extension Office by June 1. Size of space may vary according to number of projects to be exhibited.
- 3. Each Service Unit will select a theme consistent with objectives, activities and accomplishments of Girl Scouting in each of their respective communities. Service Unit name must be attractively displayed on the base of the booth. Exhibits will be judged against other Girl Scout Service Unit exhibits.
- 4. Booth exhibits must be completed and in place by 12:00 noon on Monday, September 4, 2023. The Jr Fair building will be open for setting up from 5:00 p.m. to 8:00 p.m. on Wednesday, August 30th and Thursday, August 31st; from 10:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. on Sunday, September 3rd and 10:00 a.m. to 12 noon on Monday, September 4, 2023. Exhibits must remain complete until 12 noon on Sunday, September 10, 2023. Booth tear-down will be from 12 noon to 3 p.m. on Sunday, Sept. 10, 2023. All booths must be removed by 3:00 p.m. Sunday. (Please note: These are Fair Board times and do not over ride the Girl Scout Judging Day deadline of 1:30 p.m. on Monday, Sept. 4.) Again, NO project is to be removed before release times listed. Violation will result in forfeit of troop booth premium.
- 5. Booths are constructed of bare plywood and should be covered with background material. White paper will be available for your use; however, any color or type of material may be used. All other supplies and equipment needed for completing displays must be furnished by the individual Service Unit.
- 6. Nothing may be hung from the ceiling and no paint is to be used on any part of the booth. The use of electricity is strictly forbidden. 7. DO NOT USE NAILS, GLUE OR SCREWS IN BOOTHS. DO NOT STAPLE PROJECTS TO YOUR BOOTH DISPLAY, JUDGES WILL BE HANDLING PROJECTS. Use

tape, thumb tacks or staples. These MUST be removed when the exhibits are taken down at the end of the fair. All paper and trash should be deposited in cans outside doors, and area in front of booth is to be swept. Booth premiums will be forfeited if cleanup is not done properly. A Junior Fair Department Advisor must check your booth before you leave. All booths must be checked and approved for premiums to be awarded.

- **8.** If room permits, space will be provided for oversized projects that do not fit into individual club booth exhibits.
- **9.** Each club member's name must be attractively displayed within the exhibit other than on the Junior Fair cards.
- Club name must be attractively displayed on the base of the booth.
- 11. Booth exhibits will be judged according to the following point system:

BOOTH PREMIUMS

- 1. Boys Scouts, by packs, may exhibit their projects, crafts and camp projects as well as displays highlighting the basic components of the scouting program.
- **2.** To exhibit, the boy must be a registered Tiger or Cub Scout.
- **3.** A participation ribbon, attached to a 3X5 card, will accompany each entry, to be filled out by the den leader or pack leader.
- **4.** Booth exhibits must be complete and in place by 12 noon on Mon. Sept. 4, 2023. The Jr. Fair Building will be open for setting up from 5 p.m. to 8 p.m. on Wednesday, August 30th; Thursday, August 31st; from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. on Sunday, September 3rd; and from 10am to 12 noon on Monday, September 4th, 2023. Exhibits must remain complete until 12 noon on Sunday, September 10th, 2023. Booth tear-down will be from 12 noon to 3 p.m. on Sunday, September 10, 2023. All booths must be removed by 3:00 p.m., Sunday. (Please note: These are Fair Board times and do not override the Girl Scout Judgeing Day deadline of 1:30 bp.m. on Monday, Sunday 4.) Again, NO project is to be removed before release times listed. Violation will result in forfeit of troop booth premium.
- 5. Each pack may arrange booth display according to individual booth themes. Theme of exhibit will be selected by exhibiting organization. Themes should stress values which organization deems most important to youth work. Theme should be incorporated throughout exhibit in telling the story of organization's purpose. goals, philosophy, activities and/or achievements.
- **6.** Booths are constructed of bare plywood and should be covered with background material. White paper will be available for use; however, any color or type of materials may be used. All other necessary supplies and equipment for completing displays are to be provided by each pack designing the booth.
- **7.** Do not hang anything from the ceiling. The use of electricity is strictly forbidden.

- 8. DO NOT USE NAILS OR SCREWS OR GLUE in booths. Thumb tacks, tape and staples are to be used and must be removed at the time of booth dismantling after the fair.
- 9. All paper, staples, tape, etc. from dismantling displays MUST be deposited in trash bins at Junior Fair Building. Clean-up is mandatory for each booth space.
- **10.** All booths must be checked by Jr. Fair Dept. Advisor and approved before you leave. Failure to clean up booth or have your booth checked prior to leaving will result in the forfeit of booth premiums.
- **11.** Armbands to cover the cost of daily admission to the fair are available at a cost of \$5 per registered Boy Scout and \$10 per registered adult troop leader for those exhibiting projects in the fair, provided all registration information and armband fees are received by the Senior Fair Board Secretary by Aug. 1, 2023 by 5pm
- THERE WILL BE NO EXCEPTIONS. Armbands are to be requested for exhibitors and adult volunteers through only one Junior Fair Organization.
- **12.** Space will be provided for oversized projects that do not fit into individual club booth exhibits.
- **13.** Each club member's name must be attractively displayed within the exhibit other than on the member's cards. Advisors names may also be displayed.
- **14.** Club name must be attractively displayed on the base of the booth.
- **15.** Booth exhibits will be judged according to the following point system:

- 3. Participate in two parades in Belmont County. Any arrangements needed for the above must be made by the royalty themselves.
- 4. Royalty to meet with the Junior Fair Advisor following the crowning to review fair responsibilities. Refer to the Junior Fair Royalty Application for the complete and up-to-date list of Expectations of Junior Fair Royalty during the Fair.
- 5. All candidates selected for Junior Fair Royalty Court must participate in Royalty Orientation on Thurs., August 24, 2023 at 4:30 p.m.

SHOWMAN OF SHOWMEN CONTEST

RULES/PROCEDURES

- 1. Open to Master Showmanship winners of current year. In the event that the Master Showman of a species is ineligible or unable to participate the opportunity will be given to the next highest placed Master of Showmanship participant that is eligible and willing.
- 2. Participants will show in class for each species except the species in which he/she is Master Showman. Species to participate will be: Beef, Dairy, Goats, Horse, Sheep, Swine, Poultry, and Rabbit.
- 3. Master Showman from each species will be responsible for obtaining enough animals and equipment to show that species, to form a class of seven. Each Master Showman is responsible for having people available to assist in getting animals into show ring on schedule.

- **4.** The Master Showman of each species will serve as the judges. At completion of each class the Master Showman will give comments on the correct way to show the species.
- **5.** Each class will have 10 minutes to show.
- **6.** Participants should dress according to dress code for species of which he/ she is Master Showman.
- 7. Order of show: Rabbits, Poultry, Beef, Dairy, Hogs, Sheep, Goats, and Horses.
- **8.** Participants will be placed from 1st 7th with points scored equal to placing.
- **9.** Scores will be kept confidential.
- **10.** The participant with the lowest score will be the Showman of Showmen.
- **11.** Any disputes regarding this contest will be resolved by a committee of adults representing 4-H, FFA, Jr. Fair Board, Sr. Fair Board and the Showman of Showmen Committee Advisor. The protest procedure as listed under Junior Fair Rules, including the \$50 deposit will be followed.
- 12. If a person wins the Showman of Showmen Contest once, they cannot participate in the contest again.
- 13. After winning master showmanship and/or given the envelope/packet

to participate in the Showman of Showmen Contest, the exhibitor has 24 HOURS to return the envelope/packet to the Junior Fair Office. If outside of the timeframe for ANY REASON, the exhibitor automatically forfeits their eligibility for that species. **NO EXCEPTIONS!!!** The opportunity will automatically be given to the next highest placed Master Showmanship participant for that specific species.

14. If an exhibitor wins Master Showmanship and/or receives the Showman of Showmen envelope/packet for more than one species, they are still required to turn in the packet/envelope within the 24-hour timeframe. The exhibitor will be able to choose the species they would like to represent. The open/vacant species envelope/packet at this point, will be passed down to the next highest placed Master Showmanship participant.


